## SHIPPERS MUST OBSERVE LAWS

Watering of Dried Apples to Be Made a Serious Offence.

(Special to The Toronto World) OTTAWA, Nov. 29.—The minister of agriculture will be asked to introduce legislation next session which will be designed to put a stop to the practice of watering dried apples or exporters watering dried apples which they export to other countries.

This is the statement made by the trade and commerce department. What has rendered the new legislation imperative is the fact that shippers of dried apples have been in the habit of seeking them with a certain amount of water in order that they will weigh more, and so a greater price will be obtained. This practice is ruining the credit of Canadian growers in Britain and other countries, and as it appears that dishonesty can only be curbed by resorting to punishment legislation for that purpose is to be introduced.
