doors from it was the draper shop of good old Izaak Walton, the angler. The Church of St. Bride's, with its graceful steeple, contains the remains of Richardson, the author of "Clarissa Harlowe," and other persons of note. Chatterton was interred in the burial-ground of St. Andrew's workhouse, Shoe Lane, now Farringdon Market.

Passing the site of Temple Bar we enter the Strand, of which Charles Lamb says: "I often shed tears in the motley Strand, for fulness of joy at so much life." Directly ahead, the old Church of St. Clement's Danes stood across the way, as if blocking it up. Stowe says that the church was thus named because Harold, a Danish king, and other Danes were buried here. Among the distinguished dead sleeping here are Otway, Nat, Lee, and Rymer.

Passing the new Courts of Justice on our right, we reach in a few moments Somerset House on
