with the Government of this Country, that all. offices should be given at its difcretion; and here, from the delicate nature of the cafe, the

Legislature had thought proper to interpofe. and to reftrain the Supreme Magistrate, the head of the Executive Authority, and limit him in his appointment to these offices: but furely this differed effentially from any degradation, difgrace, or punishment, of the Diffenters. It was neceffary for the Houle to confider the danger; and here he declared he meant not to impute views to men, which many of them disclaimed, and who professed to be well-wifhers to the Eftablished Church: but there were others among them, as the Diffenters themfelves well knew, who had held a very different conduct, and not only objected against many of the doctrines of the Established Church, but went fo far as to contend against the propriety of there being any eftablishment at all. There would furely, therefore, be fome little degree of rashness, and of danger, in placing offices in the hands of perfons of this defcription. So far then for the purport of this Act, which had most unjustly been termed a perfecution of the Diffenters in general. With regard to one other argument urged by the Right Hon. Gentleman, and tending to perplex
