diate and perfonal influence upon the ruins of public parliamentary responsible Adminiftration has been the great object of the present reign--- that the latter is a system admirably calculated to fecure the independency of Parliament and the rights of the people, without endangering the just prerogative of the Crown---- and that the former tends evidently to fubvert the independency of Parliament and the liberties of the people by throwing the whole weight of power into the hands of the King. Now no man will have the effrontery to deny that the last Administration were forced into power by the fole efficiery of parliamentary fupport in direct opposition to fectet influence which they flood pledged to detect and refift in all its forms. Hence the reluctant delay with which they. were at first admitted into office-hence the artful and fuecesful attempt to break their force by tempting Lord Shelburne with a bait which he had not ftrength of mind to refift---hence the rage and despair. occasioned by the Coalition, which once more enabled parliamentary fupport to take perfonal influence by ftorm as it has been" B 2 em-

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
