Ottawa, March 19, 1906.
The following is the memorial on certain statements regarding the duties on sugar fyled March 2, 1906, with the tariff commission by the Canada Sugar Refining Co., in reply to the memorandum submitted by Mr. Robert Anderson on the same subject:

On the 5th February Mr. Robert Anderson, acting on behalf of Messes. Robert Crooks & Co., importers of refined sugar, presented to you an elaborate statement in regard to the sugar distinctions of the canadian duties on sugar, under which Mr. Anderson asserts the refiners have a complete monopoly of the Canadian market, and amass enormous profits at the expense of the Canadian consumer.

Mr. Anderson supports his case with

Under these circumstances, the reply which we now make is an endeavor to show you that Mr. Anderson is not a reliable authority on this matter, and to give to his conclusions an emphatic denial and contradiction as inconsistent

Before, however, dealing with the main question, one or two points may be noted. On page 3 Mr. Anderson Esserts, quoting his own words, referring to last season: "The refiners were maintaining an artificially high market in Canada until recently, when they reduced their prices to make as unprofitable a return as possible for the domestic beet factories in Ontarie." This statement is absolutely devoid of any foundation, as the following facts will show:
