A GHASTLY AFFAIR.

The Cemetery Washed Out and Skeletons Floating Around. Athens, Nov. 29.—The loss of life by the floods is much larger than was at first reported. Forty bodies have been recovered at the Piraeus and boats are out searching for persons who are missing and who are supposed to have perished. The cametery at the Piraeus was inundated. The water swept across the burial place with such violence that a number of bodies and skeletons were washed out of their resting places and carried for a considerable distance. No reliable estimate of the total damage to property can yet be mace, but it is known that the loss will amount to a large sum.


