

TEMPORARY PAVING IS ORDERED AS ECONOMY

War Prices Block Permanent Road for Wingham Street, Ingersoll.

INGERSOLL, June 21.—The question of improving Wingham street, which has been before the council for some time, has finally been decided by the paving committee. There was a feeling in some quarters for permanent work, but it was decided by the paving committee that because of the unusual expenses on account of the war, the street should be repaired by the use of gravel that is being hauled from King street, where permanent work is being done.

LT.-COL. BART ROBSON UNANIMOUS CHOICE OF E. MIDDLESEX LIBERALS

Strong Support Pledged at Big Convention to Popular Commander of Middlesex Battalion.

Lt.-Col. Bart Robson, former commander of the 15th Middlesex Battalion, was nominated as Liberal candidate for the east riding of Middlesex yesterday afternoon, to contest the seat for the Provincial Legislature. Eight were proposed—Messrs. Colin Campbell of Dorchester, Lieut.-Col. Robson, Warden Archie Blake of Westminster, John W. Laidlaw (former candidate), John McIntyre of Dorchester, Claude Nanagan and J. Harry Fowler of London, and Mrs. W. W. Scott of Mossley. All retired save Col. Robson and Warden Blake, and on the ballot the former had the majority of votes. Warden Blake moved that the nomination be made unanimous. The motion was carried.

Mrs. Hishop of Toronto spoke on the work of the women's organizations. There were five women delegates present. E. Griest of Westminster, president, was in charge of the business meeting. Sam Carter, M. P. P., Guelph, made a characteristic speech, and Mr. M. Ross of London, the Liberal candidate for the House of Commons for East Middlesex, was given a most hearty reception.

Highly Honored. In opening the meeting, President Griest mentioned the fact that Sir Arthur Currie, a Middlesex boy, had been appointed commander of the Canadian Legion in France. The compliment was appreciated, and Middlesex should be proud to have been the birthplace of so distinguished a man.

He is the latest of a long line of splendid men who have come from this county," said Mr. Griest.

The nominations were then received, and all the nominees mentioned above retired, save Lieut.-Col. Robson and Warden Blake. Mr. Scott made a good impression, and made it certain that Liberal women are going to take an active part in the campaign.

Was Broken Up. Lieut.-Col. Robson dealt at some length with the history of the 15th Battalion. When he was asked to form a battalion it was on the understanding that when he returned to England it was to go to England as a unit, and then to France as a unit. He went to work on that basis, and for months worked hard to get the regiment in shape. He succeeded in doing so, and when he went abroad he was again assured that the battalion would not be broken up. The 15th was trained in England under his command for several weeks, and passed under the inspection of Lord French, Gen. Hunter and others, and they were delighted with the work of the Middlesex boys. One day he was called into the brigade offices and told that his battalion had been broken up. He was to go to France for a period of a month, and then to proceed to Canada, but when he got to England he was offered the command of a cavalry battalion. As the command of a cavalry battalion, the colonel had gone over to France to fight, he refused the offer, and he was sent back to Canada.

Not His Fault. "I suppose I had decided to take a soft snap, I could have been there yet," said Col. Robson. "I did not do that, preferring to come to Canada, and work my own way. If I could not take my boys to the firing line as a unit, as had been promised me, I left the matter to the best of terms. They were disappointed, as I was, when we were broken up, but that was none of my fault. If any person wants to blame me, let them look into the case and get at the facts. Other battalions have been broken up. I do not suppose that there is more charge of a battalion, and that is Col. Graham of London."

He expressed his willingness to allow his name to stand. He was at the service of the party.

"I have been pressed to be a candidate, and, although I believe that there are stronger men than myself in our ranks, I am willing to be a candidate," said Warden Blake. "I am a Liberal, through and through, and of a Liberal than I ever was, and I am glad to serve. No matter who gets the nomination, I am with him all the way through."

At End of Tether. John W. Laidlaw, in declining, mentioned the fact that the Conservative party was at the end of its tether. Sam Carter, M. P. P., Guelph, started the regular speaking machine by saying that the Conservative party was at the end of its tether. Political patronage gave the party in power 25 per cent of an advantage, and in addition to the principle, men were controlled by jobs, not principle.

Will Clean Up. "I am a follower of N. W. Rowell, the cleanest and biggest man in the province of Ontario today," declared Col. Robson. "When he gets in, he will clean things up. Rowell has sounded the clearest note of any statesman in Canada since the war broke out. He has stood by his principles, and he has seen some of these principles put into force, even if he could not do it himself. He has settled the liquor business in Ontario for good. I would not like to be in the position of the men who accepted liquor bribes from liquor men, and then doubled-crossed them. When the club of people of Ontario swung their way, they ducked under the table. The politicians of Canada led by force, even the people. If they were not we would never have broken and spavined and
