Hundreds of children of soldiers gathered at 2 o'clock today at the Lyric Theatre to welcome Santa Claus and to participate in the distribution of gifts and to enjoy the supper which has been provided for them by the generosity of the Y. M. C. A.

Santa Claus arrived at the rooms of the Returned Soldiers' Association at 1:30 p.m., and took on a large contingent of goods marked for the little ones. Preceded by the band of the 19th Battalion, and accompanied by seven sleighs bearing returned men, Santa Claus drove around the market and up Dundas street to the Lyric Theatre.

Promptly at 2:15 p.m. the lights were turned out and the pictures turned on for the children. After half an hour of that, Lieut.-Col. W. G. Coles stepped onto the stage and in a few words announced the purpose of the entertainment and publicly thanked the various individuals and firms who had been instrumental in making it a success.

Santa Claus appeared from the wings and for more than an hour, the children were delighted with his benevolent attitude, and said that no one of them was forgotten. All got presents.

reprint of the comment of the morning papers with the one word "No!" in large black type and under it "Our answer to President Wilson's Peace Essay." "Amazing Note," indicate in slight measure the astonishment caused by the communication. Much speculation is indulged in as to the motives or cause which inspired the president to send such a note after his assumption of the attitude that he would not mediate unless invited by both groups of belligerents.

One section of the press, utterly rejecting any idea of the possibility of peace negotiations as the outcome of the recent German note, flatly attributes the president's action to the success of propaganda conducted by Count Bernstorff in America, and what they describe as the inactivity of the British Government. The more general impression is that the agitation in America for an embargo on food exports had much to do with Mr. Wilson's action. It is also suggested that the president may have received special information from the German Government and is aware of the extent to which Germany is prepared to go toward "reparation, restitution and guarantees." This is the view expressed by the Daily Chronicle. Some discussion is also devoted to the chances of Congress passing food export measures and possibly an embargo on cotton and war materials.

THE LOCAL MARKET

New wheat dropped on the local market to \$1.50 a bushel today, a decrease of 10 cents. Old wheat was comparatively steady at \$1.20 to \$1.40 a bushel. Oats fluctuated a little, but the general price was \$2 a cwt. Hay was firmer at \$12 to \$14 a ton.

Potatoes are a little higher at \$2.10 to \$2.25 a bag than yesterday.

Poultry prices are unchanged, and a big market in this line is looked for on Saturday. Turkeys are selling for \$2 to \$3 a pound, and geese for 19c to 20c. Chickens sell for \$1.50 to \$1.80 a pair, and ducks for 70c to \$1.20.

Dairy prices are steady. Creamery butter is retailing at 47c to 49c a pound, and dairy butter, in rolls, for 46c to 47c. Butters, in crocks, bring 45c to 46c a pound.
