FOOD BOARD ASKED TO ENFORCE LAW WHEAT SUBSTITUTES

Western Ontario Bakers Meet at Tecumseh House and Pass Resolutions.

At a meeting of the bakers of Western Ontario held in the Tecumseh House Wednesday afternoon, a resolution was passed and will be forwarded to the Canada food board asking it to enforce the law regarding the selling of

Sixty-five bakers from the districts between Owen Sound and Windsor and Sarnia and Brantford, including St. Thomas and Tillsonburg, were gathered together to discuss the regulations regarding wheat flour substitutes.

Want Law Enforced. The bakers present at the meeting objected to the manner in which the Canada Food Board is enforcing the law with regard to the selling of suisitutes of wheat flour by the retailers, flour and feed men and others.

They claim that wheat flour is continually sold for domestic consumption purposes without the purchaser being compelled to take the required amount of substitutes.

The bakers claim they cannot sell bread made from wheat four substitutes, as required by the Canada Food Board, as long as the housewife is sllowed to buy wheat flour without substitutes. There was a difference of opinion as to the advisability of the miller selling flour containing the required substitutes. Several of the bakers were in favor of this method to overcome the problem.

Asks For Co-operation.

John Turnball of Toronto, inspector of provincial commercial bakeries for the Canada Food Board, explained the the Canada Food Board, explained the necessity for the continued use of substitutes for wheat flour by the commercial bakers. He expressed a desire for the hearty co-operation of all the commercial bakers.

Mr. Turnball stated that he thought the Canada Food Board would improve the wheat flour on the new crop by reducing the extraction point for milling purposes from 76 per cent to 74 per cent, and point three per cent of all wheat milled.

PTE. ARTHUR WATSON PRONOUNCED GUILTY BY COURT-MARTIAL

Woodstock Man, Charged With Desertion, Convicted on His Own Evidence.

Pte, Arthur Watson, aged 24 years, and long a resident of Woodstock, was tried by a general court-martial yesterday afternoon and found guilty of desertion. Pte. Watson told the court, when asked if guilty, that so far as he knew he was guilty, as the military authorities consider it desertion when a man absents himself from his majesty's forces. He was sentenced and the sentence will be confirmed at Ottawa before being promulgated.

When asked by the court if he cared to make a definite statement on oath. Pte. Watson replied in the affirmative When advised that he had three choices, namely, to withhold any statement whatever, make a statement on his oath, he still persisted in making the statement on oath.

In the statement which followed he claimed to have been under the influence of liquor, and had not the least idea that he had enlisted. He claims to have left his home with the intentions of getting a drink. After fulfilling his intentions he went to a friend's house, and while there drank some hard cider. After that he then left with some friends for the hotel, where he again had another drink.

He does not remember leaving the hotel, as he was then entirely unconscious of any further happenings. When he came to himself again he was home in bed, this being the following morning. On the same morning his wife asked him if he had enlisted, and he replied, "Not that I know of."

Feeling restless about it, he went to Capt. Spencer, the O. C. mobilization centre in Woodstock, and asked him if he had enlisted. Capt. Spencer informed him that he had done so on the previous evening. Watson asked if there was anything that could be done, as he explained that he was drunk at the time. Capt. Spencer told him he had seemed somewhat drunk when he enlisted, and he would see what he could do for him. Capt. Spencer later advised Watson to come to the London mobilization centre.

Watson came to London the following day, but claims that he was again under the influence of liquor. On his arrival he went to Carling Heights, and after looking around for a time for some of the officials, and not finding them, he returned to Woodstock. Feeling ashamed of his disgraceful conduct he then left Woodstock and went to Toronto, where he obtained employment with the Simpson Company. After working there for some time he returned to Woodstock, his wife having given birth to a child.


