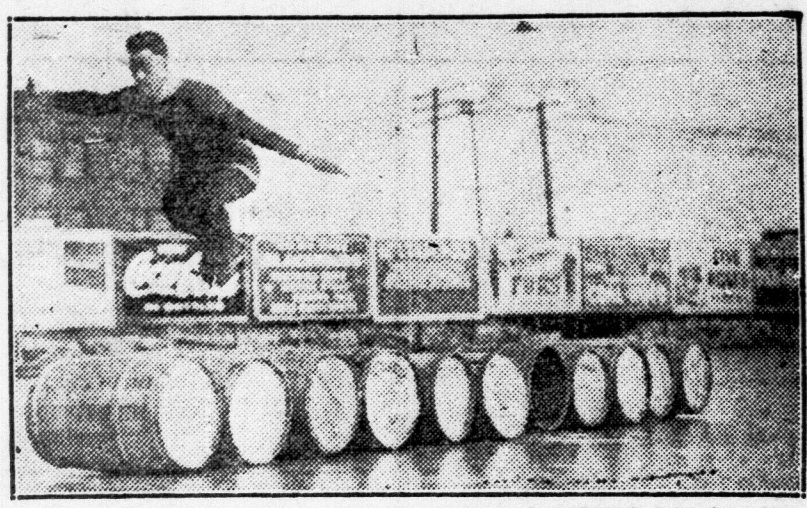

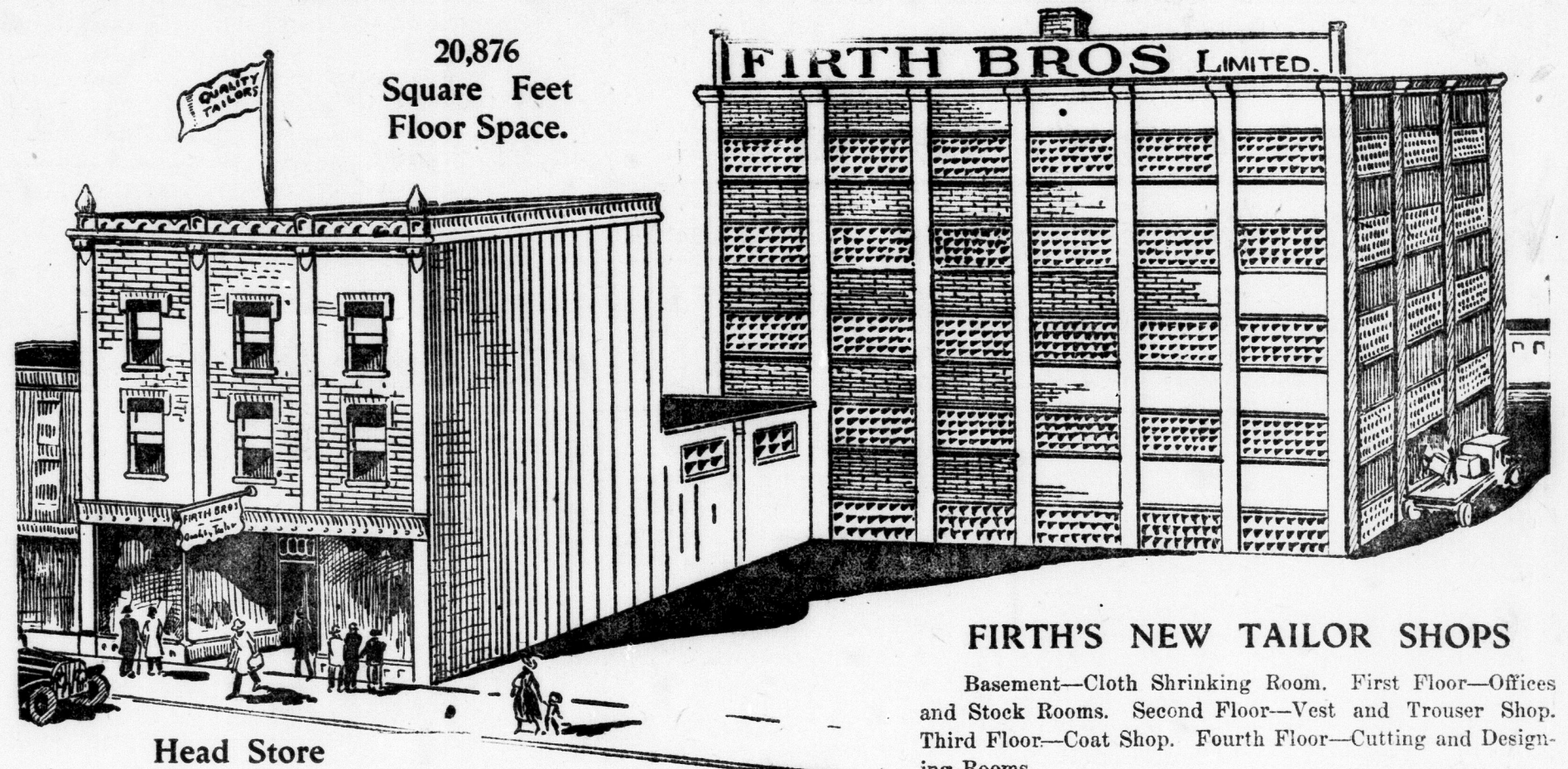
The C. A. C. challenged any junior basketball outfit, 16 years or under, to a game, any time or any place.

This decision, announced today, is necessitated by the fact that the final trial for places on the American team, which will sail for Belgium on July 24 will be held in conjunction with the Amateur Athletic Union championships.
