# TRACK REVENUES

Windsor Track Made Slightly Below \$100,000 in Two

Toronto, April 15.-Interesting data on the various racing associations in the province is furnished in the report which has been furnished the Govern-ment by Messrs. A. Clarkson, Gordon & Dilworth under the order-in-council dated April 30, 1917. The affairs of each of the associations are presented, the cash receipts, disbursements and other information being supplied. The \$10,000 a day tax would evidently wipe out any surpluses that have been re-

dividends on capital expenditures \$167,-757, receipts in excess \$97.742. The Thorncliffe Racing and Dreeding Association. Toronto, is shown with cash receipts of \$91,464 and disbursements, not including expenditures on construction account. \$109.544, disbursements in excess \$18,000 and disbursements not included \$14,000. The Northern Riding and Driving Association. Kenilworth Park, Windsor, is credited Kenilworth Park, Windsor, is credited with cash receipts of \$214,008, and the disbursements were not ascertained.


