The leading United States markets all have shown big deliveries all the fall and winter. Certain knowing ones in those markets predicted light runs after the Xmas market passed, but still the stream of pork pours in and prices accordingly drop. Packers have no stocks in their cellars, but the consuming public have not been purchasing as formerly, owing to the peculiar monetary conditions.

Prices over there have been all along much lower than in Canada. To-day our markets report \$5.70, while the Chicago markets range about the \$4.40 mark, leaving a difference of about \$1,30 in our favor. Thus the Canadian farmer is protected to that extent.
