CONMEE IS BLAMED NOW FOR CAUSING BLOCKADE

Put Spoke in Wilfrid's Concession Plans—Fielding Talks Seriously of Closure.

OTTAWA, June 5.—(Special).—The temper of the house is being tried sorely these days, and everybody will welcome the conclusion of peace negotiations, which may be reached early next week.

It is now stated that the two leaders have all but reached a basis of agreement when an unexpected difficulty arose. This time it is James Conmee of Port Arthur who is responsible for the hitch.

The prime minister's overtures to Mr. Borden with respect to the Manitoba districts are held in shape and he urged his leader not to give way to the opposition, and there the matter rests.

There may still be a settlement that will be agreeable to Mr. Conmee. It is, however, satisfactory to know that Sir Wilfrid is willing to concede the opposition's contention with regard to Manitoba.

Talk of Closure.

Parliament-to-day talked closure. Both sides talked, thus delaying business. So far the honors for long-distance talking are about even.

Duncan Ross, H. W. Kennedy and D. A. Gordon were those who wanted the gag applied to the opposition. Throughout the day the debate was acrimonious, and Finance Minister Fielding, who agitates himself unduly when things do not go to suit him, was visibly annoyed.

C. L. Owen (Northumberland) made his maiden speech, and, in doing so, aroused the ire of the petulant finance minister. The baby member handed himself well, and is receiving praise for the manner in which he ruffled the experienced parliamentarian.

Quoting the speech of Hon. Mr. Patterson at Brantford the other evening, in which the minister of customs said there were 1800 men in his department who could not get their money because the opposition held up the supply, Mr. Patterson asked for an increased expenditure and could not give a satisfactory explanation of what it was for.

But before Mr. Patterson went away Monday night, every dollar of his estimates had been voted. This he showed by reading a summary of the business of the past month, published in The World, "a paper that was generally reliable," he observed. Of course, the money was not yet available, because the government had not brought down the supply bill.

On a High Horse.

Mr. Fielding charged Mr. Owen with unfairness in bringing up the matter in the absence of the minister. He would repeat that not one dollar had been voted for customs or postoffice departments.

"Why don't you bring on your supply bill?" asked Mr. Owen.

"We don't propose to allow the gentleman opposite to dictate to us what we shall do," retorted Mr. Fielding, who reiterated the charge that the opposition was responsible for money not being available.

Mr. Owen further agitated the finance minister when he recalled that gentleman's observations that the opposition had no rights except what the majority should choose to give.

With convulsive voice Mr. Fielding reiterated the statement. But he went on, the trouble was that the opposition had too many rights, which permitted them to delay the business of the house to an extent that would not be tolerated in any other deliberative chamber. It was difficult to convince people outside that a majority did not rule, that this parliament could allow such freedom of discussion as would enable an opposition to hold up a measure for a whole session. This was one of the rights which the opposition had no right to abuse.

Mr. Owen mentioned the incidents of 1888.

"There was never an hour," replied Mr. Fielding, "when supplies were not available. What was held up was supplies for a future period, and there was abundant money for immediate purposes." But the opposition to-day had a mistaken idea of their privileges.

Mr. Lancaster of Lincoln followed, pointing out that the minister of customs, who was paid by the country for looking after business, was away meddling in Ontario elections, whereas if an ordinary member stayed away he lost his pay.

He alluded to the attitude of the Liberal opposition in 1886, when they prevented the voting of supply, and for six weeks the civil servants were out of their pay. At the present time an objectionable bill was in the way, and until the obnoxious sections were withdrawn the opposition had a right which they would maintain as long as they could endure.

Declared Unparliamentary.

"We had a minister of justice," said Mr. Taylor—and Mr. Lancaster agreed. "Once," he said—"but now we have a minister of justice brought up at the feet of ex-Premier Ross to do his dirty work."

This was declared to be unparliamentary, and Mr. Taylor withdrew the expression. He went on to say that the opposition would be worse than ever if they did not stay here till the bill was amended. In conclusion, he invited the government to attempt to apply the closure.

F. B. Carvell asked if the people of Canada would justify the government in withdrawing the election bill, and there were cries of "No" from the government supporters. There was only one solution to the present difficulty, namely, to adopt the closure, and it was up to the government to take a better grasp of conditions.

Haughton Lennox declared that the reason no progress was being made was because the government was attempting to cloud the issue until the elections in Ontario and Quebec were over.

Dealing with Mr. Patterson's complaint, that he could not get money for customs employees, he quoted the minister as telling the opposition that if the estimates passed the cheques would be sent out forthwith.

Dr. Chisholm thought both sides talked too long and too much, and that the sessions were growing so long that it would be impossible for men in poor health to come to parliament. From the counties of Huron, Bruce and Wellington, he said, six men came down in 1904 to sit in parliament and three of them are dead.

"Let us stop acting like children," he said, "and get to business."

He thought half a dozen back-benchers on both sides could settle the difficulty, and they should take it out of the hands of the two leaders.

FIRE IN BIG HOTEL

Chateau Frontenac Scorched—Damage Not Great.

QUEBEC, June 5.—A fire was discovered in the Chateau Frontenac about 3 o'clock this morning, in the wall of the second story, supposed to be due to a defect in the electric wiring. The fire brigade were promptly on the scene, but owing to the solid structure of the building it took over an hour to reach the seat of the fire and extinguish it. Some of the guests were badly scared, and moved to other rooms, but there was no panic. The majority of the people in the house were not in bed.

The fire was at the head of the main stairway and the magnificent drawing rooms, the bedrooms and the offices are a wreck from the tons of water poured on. The damage by fire is nothing. The total damage is estimated at \$10,000.

SIX KILLED ON WARSHIP.

Explosion of Boiler Tube on U. S. S. Tennessee Has Dreadful Results.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., June 5.—A boiler tube on the cruiser Tennessee blew up to-day, killing six men and injuring ten others.

The Tennessee sailed from San Francisco on May 10 and since then has been cruising in Southern California waters, touching at Santa Barbara, San Pedro and San Diego.

The injured will be brought to a hospital in this city. The Tennessee is still about 37 miles outside San Pedro.
