The company is considering pumping water from a lake a short distance away. Sesekinika has been well known as a gold camp. The district includes parts of Marsonville and Grenfell Townships, and is about ten miles from Swastika on the T. & N. O. Railway. The district was partially staked some years ago, but for some time no discovery of importance was made. The first free gold find was made on the Malouf claims, a half mille north of Sesekinika Lake. A little later gold was found on the Smith Labine property about a mile east of Maloufs. Since then several tellurides carrying percentages of gold have been recognized from Smith Labine vein matter. Outside of the test pits of various properties thruout the district, the extensive development work to be undertaken by the Kerr Lake Mining Company, will be the first real test-of the Sesekinika Camp. The veins in the district, tho narrow, carry considerable free gold. There are twenty-one veins on the Smith Labine properties through the Kerr Lake Company intends to follow one of the cast veins and crosscu both ways.
