ALLIES PREPARE PLAN TO COMPEL GERMANY IN CASE OF REFUSAL

British and French Military Chiefs Have the General Scheme Outlined—Belgium Would Occupy Dortmund and French Penetrate Possibly as Far as Munich—Action Would Be Based on Disarmament Sections of Treaty.

London, Feb. 27.—On the virtual eve of the allied conference with the Germans on the reparations and disarmament questions, the two principal allied military chiefs, Marshal Foch of France, and Field Marshal Sir Henry Hughes Wilson, the British chief of staff, spent the weekend by invitation with Mr. Lloyd George and Premier Briand of France, in their seclusion at Chequers Courts, the new country home of the prime minister of England.

AT LEAST 30 PERSONS KILLED ON MICHIGAN CENTRAL TRAIN FROM CHICAGO TO TORONTO

Officials at First Estimated Dead at From Forty to Fifty—Large Number Injured—Accident Occurred at Intersection in Indiana—New York Central Train Cut "Canadian" in Two—Saskatchewan Man Among Victims.

BIG FIGHT LOOMS UP OVER WAGE REDUCTION

Trades Union Leaders Charge That Number of Large Industries in Toronto Are Prepared to Throw Down Gage of Battle Today.
