

A few are vacant, but they are for sale, He states no excessive overcroweing has been observed by his inspectors, but it was no novelty to find four families occupying one house. Two and three families in one house was very common. The majority of sixtroom houses are, he says, occupied by two families and eight-roomed houses were tenented by the better class and are not within the reach of the average workingman.

Summing up his answers, Dr. Hastings states that conditions remain almost as they were one year ago. Some 194 houses were lost as dwellings in 1910, 72 being turned into factories storage houses, etc., 116 pulled down and five condemned and closed. In 1918 the number of houses "cleaned up" was 2500, as against 197 last year, this heim proof that the department's campaign for cleaner housing conditions was bearing fruit. Over 6000 houses are under constant supervision.
