SPRING HEIRS
HOLD A MEETING

Claim Town Land Upon Which Jersey City Is Built.

A meeting of some twenty-five of the representatives of the Spring heirs was held yesterday afternoon at the City Hotel.
The Spring estate, according to records, is composed of five hundred acres of land, upon which Jersey City is partially located.
In about the year 1800, these lands were owned by Albert Spring, who was dissatisfied with the state of matters, after rebellion, came to Canada and settled in Markham Township, but prior to his departure leased the land for 99 years, and the lands, of course, are now of immense value.
Representatives were present from various parts of Ontario, and two came even from British Columbia. A serious discussion the heirs decided to prosecute the claim for the estate, if funds could be obtained from the different heirs, and for the purpose of collecting funds and prosecuting any necessary action, a general committee, composed of George Spring, of East Toronto; E. H. Spring, of Mossley, Ont.; and Samuel Spring, of Michigan, were named to receive subscriptions and prosecute the claim.
The claimants for this estate are not to be confounded with the claimants of the Springer estate, who were recently mentioned in the papers. So far as is known the heirs to this estate have no connection with the Springer estate.
The committee in charge of arrangements will now take up the matter and decide whether it is desired that the matter should be prosecuted, and if it is desired to prosecute the matter a contribution will be solicited to defray expenses.

SHAREHOLDERS DEMAND SALARY CUT
Say President and General Manager Are Getting Too Much.

Toronto, May 28.—There is a lively fight on between the directors and officials of the Sovereign Bank and the shareholders. A special committee appointed by the directors, in March—Messrs. William Wallace, chairman; Senator Baird and Mr. A. F. McLaren, M. P.—The committee demands a sweeping reduction in salaries, but their efforts to date have been fruitless.
At present President Jarvis receives \$10,000 per annum; F. G. Jenmett, general manager, receives \$10,000; Robert Cassels, assistant general manager, \$5,000; R. W. Crompton, inspector, \$4,000; local manager, \$2,500; other officials, \$1,000; making a total of \$42,500.
The committee demands that President Jarvis' salary be nil, that Mr. Jenmett's stipend be cut to \$6,000, that the services of the assistant general manager, inspector and local manager be dispensed with, and that the other officials be cut to \$4,000.
The bill will also do away with the present anomaly of long-term temporary clerks.

BOYS ANNOYED SOUTH LONDON LADY
Appeared in Court Today and Were Let Go With a Warning.

John Cowan, Frank Cowan, W. Jackson, H. Newton and W. Deacon appeared in the police court today, charged with being disorderly while throwing rotten eggs into a South London lady's house, throwing stones against the building, setting off cannon firecrackers in her doorway, and using bad language.
The lady stated that she has been troubled by the boys for a long time, but unfortunately she was unable to recognize anyone, and could only say that the boys present were members of a gang which caused so much trouble.
Mr. Coates, a grocer at the corner of the Wharfedale road and Stanley street, corroborated the evidence, and identified all the boys charged, with the exception of C. Deacon, as having been there the night in question.

SWIFT CRUISER FOR PRINCE
Indomitable Will Try for a Record Trip to Quebec.

Devoport, May 28.—It is widely believed that the "Indomitable" cruiser will endeavor to make a record for the Atlantic voyage while conveying the Prince of Wales to Canada. Specially picked stokers and armaments are being selected, and it is now understood that the escort of battleships will precede her a few days. The Indomitable's trial speed was over twenty-eight knots.
Dr. Carmichael, of Manitoba, informed the general assembly of the Church of Scotland that 500 missionaries will be needed as western Canada is developing.

TAKING GREELEY'S ADVICE
Well-Known Newspaperman and His Family Going West.

Mr. James Bryan, of Lucknow, a well-known newspaperman, and until lately proprietor of the "Knowlton Sentinel," is about to leave with his family for the Golden West. Mr. and Mrs. Bryan, who have been visiting Rev. L. B. Walwin and Mrs. Walwin, Empress, have returned home to make final arrangements for their departure. Rev. Mr. Bryan, an esteemed Anglican clergyman, of Toronto, are well known in this city, where they resided for a number of years, and where, in the "Advertiser" establishment they became expert in the printer's art. Mr. James Bryan has for a long time successfully conducted the disposal of the business preparatory to going away. Mr. Bryan's son, Wilbur, who was with W. G. Young, has given up his position, and will also go west with his parents.

A HEROINE REWARDED.
New York, May 28.—Ewa Jovernicka, the young Polish woman who last Monday frustrated the attempt of three bank robbers to steal \$50,000 from the officers of the bank, said that she and her husband will be paid a reward of \$500 for a next egg, they will be in comparative independence. She fears that if she remained in this country the Black Hand would get her fortune away from her, she said.

WILBUR LUNT DEAD.
New York, May 29.—Wilbur F. Lunt, a member of the United States Board of General Appraisers, died last night at his home here. He was born in 1847 at Biddeford, Maine. He became a member of the bar and for two terms was United States district attorney in Maine.

SOME CHANGES IN
CIVIL SERVICE

An Important Feature of the Measure Will Be the Classification.

Ottawa, May 28.—The new civil service bill, to be introduced in the House by Hon. Sydney Fisher, will affect principally the members of the inside service for the present, the outside service or any part of it being left to come under the provisions of the act later on by proclamation of the governor-in-council.
The bill, as has already been stated, places the control of the service with regard to appointments and promotions under a permanent non-partisan commission. This commission will consist of two members who are to have the rank of deputy minister.
With respect to the reclassification of the service, the bill provides that instead of the present system of classification by clerks, the service is to be reorganized into "divisions," and "subdivisions." The first division will include deputy heads and the principal technical administrative and executive officers, with salaries ranging from \$2,800 to \$4,000. In the case of the deputies, however, special allowance will be made to provide a maximum salary of \$5,000, with additional allowances to the deputy ministers of justice, finance, railways and canals.
Class B of the first division will include the lesser technical and administrative officers, including the chief clerks, salaries range from \$2,200 to \$2,800, this being a considerable increase over the present maximum allowed.

The second division will include clerks whose duties enable them to qualify for holding positions in the first division. In class A of this division salaries range from \$1,500 to \$2,200, and in class B from \$800 to \$1,400.
The third division comprises other clerks whose duties are copying and routine work under direct supervision. In class A ranging from \$900 to \$1,200, and in class B from \$500 to \$800. These salaries are an increased maximum for most of the present civil service employees, varying from \$100 to \$500.

Mr. Beck's Opposition.

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DEADLOCK IN THE COMMONS
Continued From Page One.

Mr. Borden charges that Sir Wilfrid gave Premier Roblin to understand on May 19 that the Government would withdraw any attempt to override the Provincial lists in Manitoba, and that a draft of the proposed amendments to the bill was not subsequently submitted to the Opposition as promised by Sir Wilfrid. The latter has all along maintained that absolutely fair lists must be assured in Manitoba. The addresses now being received here indicate that in that province are being manipulated entirely to the advantage of the Conservatives, and under the system of registration and revision now controlled by the Roblin Government Liberals are being discredited. Before Premier Roblin's arrival in Ottawa Sir Wilfrid had made his offer of a fair compromise to Mr. Borden, leaving the whole matter of the alteration and revision of the lists to the non-partisan tribunal of the county court judges. This offer Mr. Borden absolutely refused. Consequently there was no need to submit the same proposal again to him. But yet Sir Wilfrid does not again submit a proposal which the Opposition leader has already declined to consider.

MINTOS' DIPLOMACY
Collapse of the Indian Frontier Rebellion Largely Due to Him.

Simsa, May 29.—The British punitive expedition has ended its campaign against the warring Mohmand tribesmen, and on Sunday Major-General Willcocks will return to Indian territory and demobilize his forces.
This unexpected rapid collapse of the campaign are attributed largely to the tactical management, from the political side, of the viceroy, Lord Minto, and removes what quite recently seemed a threatening situation, possibly involving an Indian war.

The British losses in the eighteen days of the campaign were six officers killed and nine wounded, seventy-two men killed and 144 wounded. Nearly half of the deaths, however, were caused by the cholera.

CAUGHT IN THE STORM.
Sandusky, Ohio, May 29.—Six Italian fishermen and two boys were caught in the severe storm on Sandusky Bay late yesterday and are missing now, clinging to a section of the wharf at the head of the bay.

The boys were sighted off Cedar Point in a sailboat. No trace of them has been found. It is thought their boats capsized.
The storm swept Erie and Ottawa counties, doing heavy damage to grapes and peaches. In Sandusky a section of a city block was unroofed and the interiors of four business houses were flooded.

LEADER MACKAY ON POWER QUESTION
Points Out Govt. Should Have Investigated Electrical Co's Proposition.

Toronto, May 29.—The Globe today publishes Hon. A. G. MacKay's latest letter to the electors of Ontario.
It deals with the power question, and in it Mr. MacKay attacks the Whitney Government for refusing to object to a proposition of the Electrical Development Company, with the consent of the Government, acquiring and operating the plant for Toronto.
Mr. MacKay points out that all the conditions indicated that the Government could have secured the plant under highly advantageous conditions. Mr. MacKay maintains that the Premier was acting as agent for the municipalities, and that he should have received the proposition and submitted it to Toronto.

DR. WILSON SPEAKS PLAINLY

Hospital Is Needed.
"The need of the tuberculosis hospital is very evident," Dr. Wilson continued. "In fact the people last January most emphatically stated that such a hospital was needed and they voted that this hospital should be established. Let me give you a couple of instances to impress this on you."

"Last year I had a case of a young man named Mitchell. He belonged to a society with which I was connected, and I looked after him. I got him into Victoria Hospital, but it was discolored that he had tuberculosis. He was told that he could take a walk, and when he did so one morning he was locked out. When he returned the doors were locked against him. He had to spend the greater part of the day in a barber shop."

"He could not get into a hospital, and he could not get into a hotel. There was no place for him to go. The society to which he belonged was willing to take care of him, but what could it do? I took up a subscription for him and succeeded in getting him enough to go to Weston, where he has since died."

Positively Brutal.
"It is positively brutal to allow such a state of affairs to exist. In spite of the fact that Victoria Hospital costs the citizens \$30,000 a year, there is no place for a consumptive to go. There is a place for scarlet fever, diphtheria and other such diseases, but for the worst of all diseases there is no place but the streets."

Another Case.
"Let me instance another case. An old man whom I treated developed tuberculosis. He was left alone with his aged and sickly wife. He was also a society man, and the society was willing to take care of him, but there was no place for him to go and get proper treatment. He could not be cared for anywhere. Well, he lingered on in misery for some time, and at last died. It was a most pitiful case. These are just examples of what is very common in this city."

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
