

REPORT.

In presenting the Sixty-First Annual Report of the New Brunswick Auxiliary Bible Society, your Committee have nothing extraordinary to state in regard to their home work. For some time past they have met monthly in the President's house, and the meetings have been always pleasant, and generally well attended. A few of the older members of the Committee have, in recognition of their long and valued services, been taken off the Committee and elected Vice Presidents. The names of these gentlemen are: Messrs. Edward Sears, Chas. Patton, John Wishart, Henry Vaughan and Jas. McMillan. The names of others to take their places on the Committee will be submitted for your approval this evening.

THE ISSUES

from the depository during the year have been slightly in excess of 1879, the number being 1,865 copies—1,600 sold here, the rest sent to Branches. About two-thirds of these were Bibles and one-third Testaments. Total value nearly \$800. As \$400* worth were imported this year the stock is reduced about \$400 and the cash in the Treasurer's hands correspondingly increased.
