Circuit Court Jury Without Leaving Their Seats Acquitted Him of The Charge - No Dishonesty on His Part.

The case against D. C. Clinch, charged with misappropriation of \$9,000 from Captain George Morrisey was finished before Judge McLeod yesterday afternoon and the defendant was acquitted without the jury leaving the box. His Honor instructed the jury that on the evidence they could not find him guilty of any direct act of misappropriation and this was necessary for a verdict of guilty.

In discharging Mr. Clinch, Judge McLeod said that, so far as the evidence disclosed, it was a matter of business necessity, and not a matter of dishonesty or misfeasance, and did not indicate any act of dishonesty on his part.

An attorney General Hazen continued argument at the opening of the afternoon session. He reviewed the evidence and answered points raised by Mr. McLeod. He claimed that the funds were in Mr. Clinch's control and that, not being able to produce the money or the stocks he was directed to buy, there was a presumption of misappropriation.

His Honor asked if the Attorney General could point to one single direct act of misappropriation.

Mr. Hazen read a letter sent by Mr. Clinch to Captain Morrisey notifying him of the purchase of the bonds and mentioned that the stock had been purchased for Captain Morrisey had been secured.

His Honor again stated that he could not ask the jury to bring a verdict of guilty if they believed the evidence.

Mr. Hazen claimed that when it was proved for the defence to show by evidence what had become of the money and they had not done so, the jury could bring in a verdict on presumption.

His Honor having intimated that he would instruct the jury, the address by counsel to the jury was dispensed with. Judge McLeod, in addressing the court, said the case was a most unfortunate one and it was clear that Captain Morrisey had lost a large sum of money. To prove the case, however, it was necessary to show some act of absolute misappropriation on the part of the defendant.

The jury through their foreman returned a verdict of not guilty without leaving their places and the defendant was discharged.
