

ST. JOHN SCHOONERS ARE BUFFETED BY STORMS

Crew of Schooner Eric Rescued When Half Dead—The Rowena Ashore at Machias and the Calabria on P. E. Island Coast.

A Provincetown despatch to the Boston Herald gives further particulars of the wreck of the St. John schooner Eric and thrilling rescue of her crew. The schooner Eric, of St. Andrews, N.B., is lying on bottom off Nauset. Her crew of five men were taken off the sinking vessel by men from the trawler Conqueror, of Gloucester, and landed yesterday at Provincetown.

The Rowena on Bar

Machias, Me., Nov. 2.—It was learned tonight that the schooner Rowena, which was ashore on Libby Island during the gale last Friday night, was the Rowena, of St. John, N. B. The vessel was blown ashore on the bar between Libby Island and Pettigrew's Island, and was apparently greatly injured. She lies in an almost upright position. At high tide the waves cut her in two and a tug will attempt to float the vessel.

The Calabria Ashore

Charlottetown, P. E. I., Nov. 2.—In the storm of Sunday the term schooner Calabria, Capt. McLean, was driven ashore near Summerside, P. E. I. The Calabria was a schooner of 450 tons, owned in St. John, and had on board Capt. Campbell, N. B., of Boston. She struck heavy at, causing her to fill with water.

Today the people of the forty-three states and two territories of the United States of America are holding an election. In twenty-nine of the states a governor and other state officers; in the others, minor state officers or justices of the supreme court, and in seven, congressmen only are to be elected. The states of the Union, with the exception of Maine, Vermont and Oregon, will vote by members of the House of Representatives. The three states named have held their state elections and will vote only on the presidential candidates in the coming election. In Arkansas and Georgia the state officers have been chosen this summer, leaving only the representatives in congress and presidential candidates to be voted for.

Speaking in Toronto He Says (People of Self Governing Colonies Should Exert Themselves to Foster Trade Within the Empire.

Montreal, Nov. 2.—Lord Milner's address this afternoon at the board of trade on tariff reform, preferential tariff and imperial unity, drew a large gathering of representatives in the industrial and financial life of Montreal. The preferential trade was carefully, even studiously, examined by Lord Milner, who argued it could be so arranged as to allow each nation to produce those goods which it was adapted to, but that each should procure those which it did not produce from other parts of the Empire.
