**THE GREAT CROP OF THE CANADIAN WEST**

Over 90,000,000 Bushels of Wheat of Which Nearly 20,000,000 Bushels is Still in the Elevators—A Record Year in the Cattle Trade.

WINNIPEG, Man., Jan. 21.—The year 1906 was one of splendid achievement along all lines of agriculture in Western Canada, and the record on the whole is one to be proud of. With the close of the year, the crop of the crop year 1906 was completed, and it is possible to gain some idea of how nearly correct have been the estimates of the yield of wheat for the three western provinces. The account stands about as follows:

Wheat marketed	1,000,000
Wheat in elevators	19,000,000
Wheat in bond	100,000

A disappointing feature about the wheat crop in transportation, which has certainly fallen far below the requirements this season. With a much larger crop than 1905 and with increased elevator capacity, 5,000,000 bushels less wheat have been shipped than during the same period in 1905. The Manitoba crop has been fairly well cleaned up, but that of Saskatchewan has hardly more than made a start. The crop of Alberta has not yet been cleaned up, but it is estimated that it will be 20,000,000 bushels to the market. This means less than 100,000 bushels of wheat are in the elevators at present. The wheat crop of the year 1906 is estimated to be 20,000,000 bushels, or a total increase of 2,000,000 bushels over the crop of 1905. The points served by elevators now in operation are 100,000,000 bushels. The majority of the elevators have been erected along the new Great

(From "The English in the West Indies," by J. A. Froude, 1887.)

**THE FINANCIAL SITUATION REVIEWED BY J. S. BACHE & CO.**

**The Problem of New Mileage—A Prosperity Problem—Money Market—The Stock Market—The Bond Market.**

NEW YORK, Jan. 18.—"The greatest business problem" has been forcibly presented by Mr. Hill this week. It may be condensed in the statement that while passenger and freight business has increased in ten years over 100 per cent, railroads have increased only twenty per cent. In other words, railroad mileage is over 80 per cent behind the business to be done; hence enormous freight blockades, tying up millions' worth of products. There are two remedies: one is to stop doing business—the other is to raise the money and build the mileage. The railroads are taking the latter course, and the enormous offerings which have been staggering the money market are the result. Each week adds to the amount asked for, as one after another presents its request, but in hand. By the first of June, stockholders will have paid out for new securities on rights, \$135,000,000, and short term notes and other borrowings will increase the amount. This certainly does not promise easy money at any time during the year.
