





Severed Arm Replaced

A man who is working at the British royal mint has been the subject of one of the most remarkable operations ever

performed. His arm was cut through

performed. His arm was cut through completely in two places and a portion was taken out. The severed arm was replaced, and the limb is now in work-ing order. The man is David Ballantine, a son-in-law of James O'Grady, M.P., and a former lance-corporal in the East Surreys.
