BRITISH SINK ONE GERMAN CRUISER ENGAGED IN RAID

Two Others Seriously Damaged—British Airmen Attack Zebrugges

Detected in a second attempt to raid the English coast the German battle cruiser squadron came under the guns of a powerful British patrolling fleet yesterday and the German armored cruiser Bluecher, 16,500 tons, was sunk and two battle cruisers seriously damaged. The remainder of the fleet escaped in the enemy's own mine-field.

The British fleet consisted of the battle cruisers Lion, Tiger, Princess Royal, New Zealand and Indomitable under Admiral Sir David Beatty, while the light cruiser squadron under Commodore Tyrwhitt was also reported engaged. The Germans engaged were the battle cruisers Derfflinger, Seydlitz and Moltke, all of the first line and very fast.

The engagement began at 9.30 o'clock and developed into a running chase of the Germans, the Bluecher going down about one o'clock. Sir David Beatty himself reports that two others of the enemy were seriously damaged, but that danger from mines and submarines prevented further pursuit. Out of 885 men on the Bluecher, 123 were saved by the victors.

British airmen, R. B. Davies and H. Pearce last week made an attack on Zebrugges and dropped twenty-seven bombs on the submarines and the guns on the Moltke. It is believed that one submarine was damaged seriously and that many casualties occurred among the gun crews. While reconnoitering before this Davies was surrounded by seven German aeroplanes, but managed to make good his escape, although slightly wounded.

The South African rebels, under Lieut. Colonel Maritz and Kemp, yesterday attacked Uptown, in Bechuanaland with 1,200 men and four guns. They were repulsed with a loss of twelve dead, three wounded and ninety-six prisoners.

An answer to Senator Stone, chairman of senate committee on foreign relations, was given in a formal document issued by the United States government, prepared by its department of state, in reply to a letter from a council of advisors, regarding the supplying of goods to Germany and Austria. If the two latter countries are inferior in naval strength, the note says, it is not the fault of the United States that they cannot get in supplies. The states to be strictly neutral in the war, with all belligerents alike. Only recently they refused permission to Canada to ship "war equipment" across Alaska.

THE STEAMERS IN THE STORM

To Halifax in seven days and seven hours from Liverpool, the R. M. S. Gramplan, Capt. Williams, docked at No. 6 berth yesterday morning after a good voyage. She brought 160 passengers, passing three icebergs in the steamer lane.

More than a month out from Swansea, with one call at Louisburg, N. S., the Battle Line steamer Eretia arrived yesterday morning after the most tempestuous voyage in the experience of Capt. Crossley, her commander. The Eretia was damaged by a hurricane on December 26, and was beleaguered by ice in the vicinity of Cape Race.

When a great wave struck the steamer, Prince George, from Yarmouth to Boston, broadside on, several members of the crew were injured and the deck fittings smashed.

Saturday's gale interfered with the towing of the Belgian relief ship Camino to Halifax and several of the steamer's crew were injured. They were transferred to the U. S. revenue cutter Androscoggin which was standing by and at two o'clock yesterday afternoon the rescue ships got their lines aboard again and resumed towing towards Halifax at five o'clock.

The American schooner J. Fallon ran ashore at Lighthouse Cove Saturday night while trying to make Halifax harbor for shelter.

GOVERNMENT NOT LIKELY TO TAKE ACTION FOR A FREIGHT RATES REDUCTION

Some Chartered Vessels May, However, be Released For Commercial Purposes

Montreal, Jan. 25.—A London cable to the Gazette says that, although certain papers are urging government action for the reduction of freight rates, it seems improbable in view of the variety of causes which have led to the present rates, that the government will be able to propose a remedy. Ship-owners plead losses arising from congestion caused by naval necessities, while a shortage of labor has encouraged the men to make exorbitant demands. One step the government may take is to release certain chartered vessels, substituting interned ships of the enemy for the storage of commodities at present in the dock sheds.

SALVATION ARMY HEAD WELCOMED

Commissioner Richards Heard at Big Public Reception in Imperial Theatre — To Deal With Unemployment Problem

Commissioner Richards, the new head of the Salvation Army in Canada, has had a busy time since his arrival on Saturday evening when he was welcomed at a reception held in the Brindley street barracks. Yesterday morning he addressed a large gathering of soldiers in the Citadel. For the public reception in the afternoon the Imperial Theatre was crowded. In the absence of the mayor Commissioner Richards presided.

Commissioner Richards spoke of his experience in the army and of the sons he had given to its service, one of whom has only recently escaped from Berlin. He was preaching the old doctrine and found that the late Commissioner Rees had paved the way well while the churches throughout Canada were giving splendid co-operation. Senator Daniel moved and W. E. Earle seconded a vote of thanks to the commissioner.

In an interview Commissioner Richards said the army would use every effort to deal with the unemployment problem as it arose in Canadian cities. A farewell reception will be tendered the commissioner this evening at eight o'clock in the Citadel, Charlotte street.
