COBB AND DAUBERT LEADING BATTERS

New York Leads National League and Chicago American League in Team Hitting

Chicago, June 18.—While Ty Cobb holds the lead in the American League and has the only batting average in the majors better than 400, new leaders have appeared in the National League, according to figures published here Saturday.

The leading batters of the National League, who have played in at least half of the games, including those of last Saturday, are: Daubert, Brooklyn, .870; Ludrus, Philadelphia, .869; Good, Chicago, .847; Doyle, New York, .835; Fletcher, New York, .827; Groh, Cincinnati, .818; Sauer, Chicago, .815; Connolly, Boston, .815.

Sauer leads in total bases 107; he and Lobert of New York are tied in runs scored with thirty-five, and Robertson, New York, Johnston, Pittsburgh, and Sauer are tied in stolen bases with thirteen each.

Cravath, Philadelphia, leads the home run hitters with nine. Cobb, Detroit, 401; Jackson, Cleveland, 364; Fournier, Chicago, 287; Veach, Detroit, 283; Lajoie, Philadelphia, 213; Crawford, Detroit, 214; Maise, New York, 212; Kavanaugh, Detroit, 201.

With sixty-one runs to his credit, in fifty-six games, 108 total bases, Cobb remains in front in those departments of the game. Caldwell, New York, batted himself into a tie with Oldring, Philadelphia, for home run honors at four each.

Chicago leads in team hitting with 203. Detroit is second with 250. Seven hundred pitchers who have worked in ten or more games are: Fisher, Chicago, won ten and lost 2;

Waiting Upon Bulgaria. (New York Sun.)

The entrance of Roumanians into the war and the consequent widening of the ever expanding area of conflict may depend not entirely upon the question of the acquisition of territory, although such may be the impression conveyed by the reported offer of the Italian king to act as an intermediary between Roumanians and Russia in the adjustment of their future rights in Transylvania and Bukovina.

The attitude of Bulgaria is likely to be a strong factor in the decision, for with risk of a rear attack from the "Prussians of the Balkans," neither Roumanians nor Greeks are in a position to hazard their fortunes on the side of the Allies.
