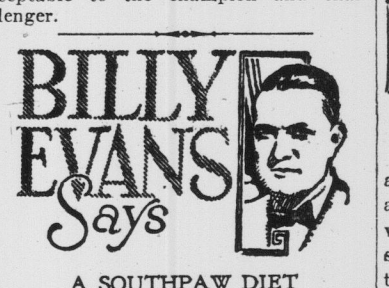
New Zealanders Win From Yorkshire Team

All great athletes have the killing instinct. Jack Dempsey had it. Tom Gibbons, a wonderful fighter didn't have it. Gibbons would pull a punch rather than annihilate a desperately hurt opponent whereas Dempsey would not. The real virtue, if it might be called so, of the killing instinct was shown recently on the courts of the West Side Tennis Club when Mrs. Molla Mallory virtually pulled herself up from the floor, defeated Elizabeth Ryan and thereby became the American champion for the seventh time.

Miss Lenglen always has been a ruthless killer. She showed no more heart to a pauper student and stage struck novice than she showed to Helen Wills when she met her for the first time last winter. She was out to win and to beat her opponent as she was here today.

Sharkey Gets Offer To Battle Dempsey

BOSTON, Oct. 27.—An offer to match Jack Sharkey, conqueror of Harry Wills, and Jack Dempsey, former world's heavyweight boxing champion, for a bout in Chicago next June has been received by Sharkey's manager, it was announced here today.

Johnny Buckley, manager of Sharkey, said that William Clements, of the Chicago Coliseum Company, had offered the Boston boxer \$150,000 to meet Dempsey. Buckley said that he would not be able to announce a definite decision in regard to the offer for two weeks because Sharkey was in New York City.

JUGOSLAVIA CHALLENGES

The reaction of the tennis world to the sweeping victories scored by the French Davis Cup players over America's Big Four in the national championship last September is evidenced by the challenge of Yugoslavia for the Davis Cup for the 1927 season. The challenge is from the Yugoslavian Tennis Association and is the earliest that has ever been received in the history of the international tennis competition. It is dated Sept. 22 and specifies that Yugoslavia will play in the European zone. This is the first time that Yugoslavia has entered the Davis Cup play.

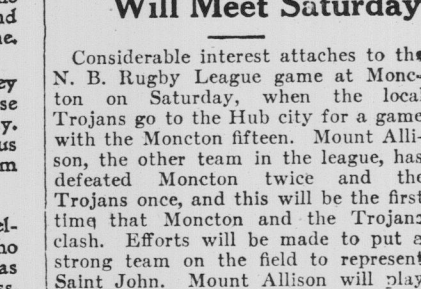
