C. P. R. Colonization Official Tells of Manufacturing Possibilities

Mayor Ommanney Says Co-operation of Government is Necessary

Major D. G. Ommanney, chief of the development branch of the C. P. R.'s Department of Colonization, of which Col. J. S. Dennis, here yesterday, is Chief Commissioner, and who is accompanying Col. Dennis on his present Maritime tour, has sufficient definite data, he thinks, upon the natural resources of this province to prove that New Brunswick is one of the most richly endowed provinces in the Dominion, and that, with a reasonable outlay of capital and consistent enterprise, this part of the continent should become a thriving centre of industry.

GREAT POSSIBILITIES.

In an interview yesterday Major Ommanney said he had made several visits to New Brunswick, and it was his firm conviction, from scientific investigation made with the assistance of eminent experts, that New Brunswick, if supported by its governmental bodies and munificent citizens in addition to the introduction of outside capital, could readily disclose to the world an attractive field for investment.

NICKEL AND COPPER.

Dr. Allcott, of the Geological Survey, Ottawa, through the investigations of Geologist John Dwyer, had been made cognizant of the presence of numerous minerals and industrial raw materials lying undeveloped in the province that should prove of great value. For instance, nickel-sulphate had been located in marketable quantities near St. Stephen, and rich deposits of copper had been located in Kings county.

A MINTO POSSIBILITY.

The Minto coal mines development, for which the visiting engineer felt sure the public would give the Canadian Pacific Railway a share of credit, has now, under favorable transportation conditions, raised its output to a quarter of a million tons annually from a modest beginning. In this industry alone the New Brunswick Government might well, Major Ommanney thinks, pursue more intensive development and experimentation. Samples of Minto coal were sent by the C. P. R. to Sir William Jones, eminent English authority, who proved it to be capable of conversion into high-grade domestic coke. Up to date, this valuable by-product has not been so commercialized.

GOLD IN CARLETON COUNTY.

The average citizen of New Brunswick is perhaps unaware that in the Pictou County and Woodstock districts of Carleton county there is a considerable possibility of uncovering rich gold deposits. Mineralogical hints gleaned hereabouts through careful investigation suggest that official action might well be taken.

BUILDING MATERIALS.

In other lines of building materials limestone, high-grade granite and sandstone are abundant but the quarrying of this little section of Canada in such generous quantities that it presents scope of quarrying, by comparison with the possibilities, seem negligible. Limestone outcroppings are seen on all sides, especially in the Saint John district. Lime is coming into greater use nowadays in the manufacture of high grade pulp and paper, another of the modern industries in which New Brunswick is engaging.

OIL AND NATURAL GAS.

HARDWOOD GALORE.

As to forest wealth Major Ommanney thinks this province could improve its hardwood output. There is a demand for hardwood in all countries and sometime ago, in company with the provincial forester, C. P. R. men ranged the available standing timber of these qualities. It was discovered that New Brunswick is especially rich in hardwood and in the opinion of the C. P. R. Development Board it is up to the local Government to call together parties owning this product and stimulate enough interest to cut and market it.

HOW TO BRING SUCCESS.

The Canadian Pacific Railway maintains a large staff of experts whose time and energy are devoted to exhaustive examinations of the resources of every section of Canada served by their lines so that as nearly the maximum of productivity will be reached. This opening up of nature's wealth creates employment and gives return on investments, floods a country with contented work-people and is the most potent factor in a desirable immigration policy.

NOVA SCOTIA AWAKE.

In the last two years the C. P. R. has distributed to interested parties no less than 35,000 synopses of definite investigations and reports on the development of new and infant industries from coast to coast, many of them in the interests of the Province of Nova Scotia, where the Dominion Atlantic Railway is a feeder of the main C. P. R. line. The Nova Scotia Government within the last few days has again conferred with the C. P. R. traveling experts and is going in for still greater

Bishop Extols Virtue of Mons. Doucet At Funeral

BATHURST, Dec. 4.—The funeral of Rt. Rev. Stanislas J. Doucet, D.P., took place this morning from his residence at the Church of St. Simon and St. Jude. The requiem mass was celebrated by the Rt. Rev. P. A. Chasson, Bishop of Chatham, with Father Savio, as assistant priest, Father Eliaison, of Petit Rocher, as deacon and Father Berube, of Belledune, as sub-deacon. These three priests were formerly curates of Monsignor Doucet.

His Lordship the Bishop of Chatham presided at the libera and Father Savio conducted the services at the grave. The funeral sermon, in French, was preached by Father Bouche, of West Bathurst, who referred to the ancestors of the late priest, the first colonists of Bathurst. Father Charles Doucet, one of the family, was a very pious man, he said.

Bishop Chasson followed in English. He stated the large number of clergy beset by the serious loss that the Church had suffered he spoke of the late monsignor as a holy priest who devoted his long life to the spiritual and temporal welfare of his people. The people had lost a good pastor and the clergy an exemplary member from their ranks. He urged the necessity of not forgetting him in their prayers and good works.

Trades Council Ask Fair Wage Officer In N. B.

THE Saint John Trades and Labor Council at its regular meeting last night instructed the executive to interview the local candidates in the federal election, urging the appointment of a fair wage officer for the province of New Brunswick. The council also instructed its secretary to communicate with Premier King at Ottawa for the same purpose. Fair wage officers have been appointed in Ontario, Manitoba and British Columbia and it was the general opinion of the meeting that there was much need for an officer of this kind in New Brunswick as men were being employed at wages below the minimum of the law. C. H. Stevens, president, was in the chair. The council also appointed an advisory committee to co-operate with the Saint John vocational committee. Those appointed on the advisory committee were representatives of four trades—machinists, carpenters, electricians and motor mechanics.

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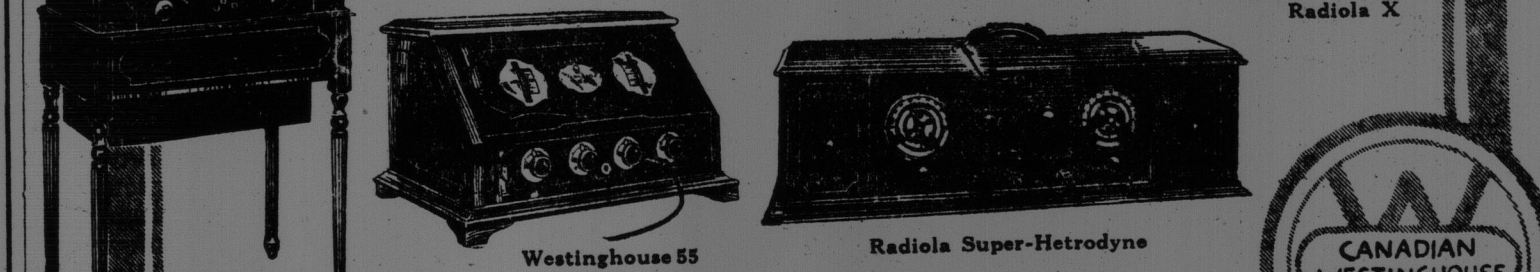
