At Plaster Rock the gypsum industry is most alluring and should be further developed in the opinion of the C. P. R. expert. There is a constantly increasing demand for gypsum products in the building trades of United States and Canada, in fact all over the world, and such an obvious natural supply as exists in New Brunswick should be commercialized to a greatly profitable degree.

BUILDING MATERIALS.

In other lines of building materials limestone, high-grade granite and sandstone abound within the narrow confines of this little section of Canada in such generous quantities that the present scope of quarrying, by comparison with the possibilities, seem negligible. Limestone outcroppings are seen on all sides, especially in the Saint John district. Lime is coming into greater use nowadays in the manufacture of high grade pulp and paper, another of the modern industries in which New Brunswick is engaging.

OIL AND NATURAL GAS. It is well known that in the Charlotte county areas granites and sandstones are abundant but the quarrying is still confined almost to local deman, though a market centinent-wide appears to be awaiting it. In Albert county, New Brunswick enjoys tracts of oil shale, and natural gas is a household commodity for a considerable section roundabouts, the same as is enjoyed domestically and industrially in some parts of the progressive West.

HARDWOOD GALORE.

As to forest wealth Major Ommanney thinks this province could improve its hardwood output. There is a demand for hardwood in all countries and sometime ago, in company with the provincial forester, C. P. R. men ranged the available standing timber of these qualities. It was discovered that New Brunswick is especially rich in hardwood and in the opinion of the C. P. R. Development Board it is up to the local Government to call together parties owning this product and stimulate enough interest to cut and market it.


