were put under pressure at twenty pounds, which is thirty-three and a half per cent. overload. On that day they slightly exceeded the allowable leakage, per cent. Overload. The next day, on October 29, the pressure was reduced to eighteen pounds, equal to twenty per cent. overload, and the leakage diminished to thirty-one and three-tenth gallons per day. The pressure was again reduced to fifteen pounds, which is the pressure designed for that class of pipe, and the leakage only amounted 23.2 gallons per day. On October 31, under the same pressure of fifteen pounds, it diminished still further to twenty-one and two tenth gallons per day. On November 8, under the same pressure, it had still further diminished to inineteen and a half gallons per day. On account of the rain today it did not give us a fair chance, and the test has not been continued. The allowable leakage is thirty-seven gallons."
