He believed that the day of profit-sharing with em-ployes was coming and a day of better relations and better understanding be-tween employer and employe would soon dawn. He believed that that day would be brought about not by the teachers but by men of high ideals in industry itself. The principles of jus-tice must pervade international as well as industrial relations. If employers could carry these prin-ciples into the business of this year, if they would be doing a greater service for the community and making a splendid contribution to the social life of Can-ada.
