COFFEE AS A STIMULANT

An English Writer Says That Tea Drinking is Less Beneficial.
Is coffee a stimulant? Many careful experiments have been conducted with the object of discovering the influence of coffee upon mental and bodily activities. It is a correspondent in The London Daily Mail. According to one investigator, coffee is "an accelerator of fatigue," but this conclusion has been repeatedly contradicted by the evidence of numerous pharmacologists.
It is found that no general rule can be laid down, but there is ample proof that the caffeine—the alkaloid contained in coffee—is a true stimulant for many persons. The belief in the restorative or stimulating properties of tea and coffee is widespread and justified, the writer says. Caffeine is to coffee what alcohol is to wine. Alcoholic beverages diminish the temperature of the body; coffee increases it. Caffeine in moderate quantities imparts energy in a number of instances, though not invariably, investigators say.
"Some constitutions resist alcohol, and the same may be said for caffeine," he says. "The effect of coffee is well marked in most persons. The pulse is slightly quickened and there is freer action of the kidneys and the skin. In large doses coffee may cause overaction of the heart and hinder digestion. Sufferers from digestive trouble may be advised to dispense with black coffee after dinner and to avoid coffee containing a high percentage of chicory."
"The medicinal use of coffee is well shown when it is employed as an antidote to certain poisons and in acute alcoholism. As a daily beverage coffee has fewer risks to the nervous system than the digestive organs than tea. There is less tannin in coffee than in tea, and for that reason it is not so likely to retard digestive processes. The action of coffee upon the brain and nervous system causes disturbed sleep or actual insomnia in some instances."
"A Spanish physician who was drinking strong black coffee with me at 11 in the morning laughed at the idea that coffee interferes with slumber. 'If it did,' he said, 'my countrymen would be nation of insomniacs.' But in Spain coffee is one of the principal beverages, and those who use it freely become notorious for their sleeplessness. It is the occasional drinking of strong coffee late in the day that causes disturbed slumber, whereas habitual indulgence renders the system proof against the anti-sleeping effects. No doubt excessive coffee drinking injures the digestion and nerves. Donetti, the musical composer, who drank fifteen cups of black coffee in the course of a few hours' work suffered from caffeine poisoning. My own experience shows that coffee is both a brain and muscle stimulant, and
