HAMMOND SEES END OF SOVIETISM

Says Russia Will Yet Have
Real Democracy—Opposes
Immediate Resumption of
Trade Relations.

Washington, Feb. 22.—John Hayes Hammond, prominently mentioned for secretary of commerce in the Harding cabinet, told the house committee on foreign affairs that he believed Soviet Russia would within a few years give way to a true democratic form of government. Mr. Hammond opposed an immediate resumption of trade with the present Russia, because Russia has nothing to sell and nothing with which to buy, and in the further ground that such trade relations as this would encourage the movement to democratic Russia.

The witness predicted that the new Russia will eventually absorb all of the present buffer states which formerly belonged to Russia, except Poland. He expressed the hope that a tripartite agreement will eventually be reached among China, Japan, and Russia, whereby Russia will cede to Japan a portion of Siberia about the size of California, on the Gulf of Japan, in return for a payment of money to be used in building a railroad through China to the Gulf of Peking.

Mr. Hammond explained that this territory was not of practical use to Russia, although rich in minerals, and would give Japan a chance to expand, while the new railroad in China would open up the vast resources of the great empire.

"The information I receive," said Mr. Hammond, "seems to be borne out by reports through diplomatic channels. There is no business in Russia of any significance. The possibilities of trade relations are very limited. Russia has neither goods nor gold to purchase from us; she has nothing on which to borrow from us. Russia is paralyzed. Her transportation system is broken down. What gold she has is, for the most part, stolen gold. It is not available to the United States or any other nation. Her present government has sent most of the gold to other nations for propaganda purposes.

"Russia has not as much gold as is generally reported, according to my reports in the accuracy of which I have entire confidence. Agriculture has dropped to insignificance, and industry is at a standstill. In a word, all Russia can sell will be taken up by other countries near by. I can see no considerable trade with Russia, and I think her condition with respect to foreign trade is well nigh hopeless. Her available timber lands are already exploited, and it will take years to develop new ones."

FOOD DROPS 3 PER CENT. A MONTH

Year's Decrease in Prices to
January Average 14 Per
Cent. in 51 American Cities.

Washington, Feb. 22.—A decrease of 3 per cent. in the retail cost of food for the average family in January compared with December, was shown in a report issued by the Bureau of Labor Statistics of the Department of Labor.

The per cent. is the average of returns of fifty-one cities on forty-four articles of food, which are the weightiest according to the quantity of each article consumed.

The greatest drop, 6 per cent., was in Los Angeles and Manchester, N. H. Cities reporting 5 per cent. decrease were Boston, Bridgeport, Portland, Ore., Providence, Rochester, and Seattle. In the 3 per cent. class were New York, Newark, Philadelphia, Washington, New Haven, Atlanta, Houston, Milwaukee, Pittsburgh, Buffalo, Cleveland, Detroit, Kansas City, Louisville and St. Paul. Baltimore, Minneapolis, New Orleans, St. Louis, and Scranton showed a drop of 2 per cent. and Birmingham, Dallas and Omaha decreased 1 per cent.

During the month 27 of the 44 articles decreased in price, the most pronounced cuts being: Strictly fresh eggs, 14 per cent.; lard, 13 per cent.; rice, 10 per cent.; cranberries, 9 per cent.; navy beans, 8 per cent.; cornmeal, 7 per cent.; navy beans, 6 per cent.; prunes, and oranges, 5 per cent. Among the increases were: Pork chops and cabbage, 9 per cent.; lamb, 6 per cent.; lamb, 4 per cent.; rib roast, 3 per cent. In the year from January, 1920, to January, 1921, the percentage of decrease in all articles of food combined was 14 per cent. Thirty-two of forty-four articles decreased, the largest cuts being: Cranberries, 26 per cent.; navy beans, 27 per cent.; coffee, 22 per cent.; cornmeal, 21 per cent.; canned tomatoes, 19 per cent.; butter, 18 per cent.; flour, 18 per cent.; prunes, 17 per cent.; oatmeal, 14 per cent.; evaporated milk, 13 per cent.; cheese, 11 per cent.

Among the articles which increased in price in the year were: Raisins, 29 per cent.; storage eggs, 10 per cent.; macaroni, 9 per cent.; rolled oats, 8 per cent.

The report compares prices for January, 1921, with January, 1920. These show that prices were this year 75 per cent. higher for all classes of food combined than they were eight years ago. Some of the increases in the eight-year period are: Storage eggs, 167 per cent.; strictly fresh eggs, 112 per cent.; bread, 111 per cent.; lamb, 104 per cent.; flour, 103 per cent.; ham, 93 per cent.; beef, 93 per cent.

As compared with the average cost in 1913 the cost of food in January 1921, in some of the cities showed these increases: New York, 76 per cent.; Newark, 68 per cent.; Boston, 74 per cent.; Chicago and Philadelphia, 71 per cent.; Salt Lake City and Seattle, 63 per cent.

HOME RULE FOR IRELAND APRIL 6

London, Feb. 21.—The privy council has decided that the home rule act for Ireland shall go into effect April 6. The first step under the act is to the issuance of writs for elections to take place three weeks afterwards. The Belfast parliament will assemble in June.

The present prospects seem to be that few candidates will come forward for the southern parliament and it seems doubtful whether this parliament will be formed.

RUSSIAN REDS LOSE BATTLE

(Canadian Press Despatch.)
Constantinople, Feb. 21.—The Bolshevik and British wireless give details of heavy fighting east of Tiflis, where the Georgians defeated the Bolsheviks, taking 4,000 prisoners and also at the town of Aktskfa.

The French claim that Tiflis fell the 19th.

Date advisers say the Bolsheviks occupied the Tiflis arsenal Saturday but that they were expelled with sanguinary losses, and now are making another attack.

An anti-Bolshevik government has been re-established at Erivan.

TO NORWAY FOR REINDEER FOR BAFFIN'S LAND

A Start Made in Steffansson's
Project—Thanks of Dominion
Government.

(Special to Times.)
Ottawa, Feb. 22.—Within this year it is expected that the project initiated by Vilhjalmur Steffansson to build up a reindeer industry on the southern part of Baffin's Land will have been put on a sound basis for future development. An agent of the company formed has been sent to Norway to purchase reindeer. He is trying to get 1,500 to ship next July and August to Baffin's Land. It will be landed in September. The market possibilities will be tested out only in ten years, when the herd is sufficiently numerous.

Mr. Steffansson believes that the discovery of oil in the north gives a new impetus to his proposals. If reindeer and similar industries could be started in the neighborhood of the oil fields or any rich mining regions discovered, the reduction in the cost of living consequent on having a near supply of food available would make development easier.

At the instance of Premier Meighen the dominion government has passed an order-in-council officially thanking Mr. Steffansson for the services he has rendered to Canada in the course of Arctic explorations. On three expeditions he has spent eleven years exploring the northern part of the Canadian mainland and the islands and seas to the north and northwest.

WANT POWER TO BUILD RAILROAD TO THE NORTH

Oil Wealth Objective of New
Company—An Application
for Time Extension.

(Special to The Times.)
Ottawa, Feb. 22.—Power to build railroad into the north—A project of the Canadian Government in the oil-rich north of the province of Alberta is being sought by a group of men who name the new project the Slave River Railway Company. According to this proposal, the road, would be started on the west bank of the Slave River at Fort Smith. It would then proceed on the same side of the river southerly to the mouth of the river at Ft. Fitzgerald. Authority is also asked to build a line for the transportation of oil and to provide necessary facilities for the storage, transportation and marketing thereof.

The company also seeks authority to establish steamship lines, develop power, run telegraph and telephone lines and all other things incidental to the development of the north. Three directors are named: Edmund Taylor, financial broker, Calgary, and John B. B. Hill, Frank Stanford, George Blinn and Cecil S. H. Pugh, all accountants of the same city.

The Western Dominion Railway Company wants an extension of the period given it in which to commence and finish the construction of a railway from a point on the International boundary in Alberta to Cardston, Pincher Creek and Crosses West branch of the C. P. R. at Long Beach and thence northerly and west of the Porcupine Hills to Calgary, as well as of four branch lines from the main line to the boundary between Alberta and British Columbia along the south and north forks of the Old Man River, the Highwood River and the Sheep River respectively.

According to the original act passed on February 27, Sunday expresses, numbers 39 and 40, between St. John and Moncton; numbers 21 and 22, between Moncton and Lévis nightly, will be taken off. St. John and Halifax express trains numbers 12 and 14, will be discontinued east of Moncton, the afternoon train from here consolidating with the Ocean Liner at Moncton. There will also be other changes. Some time ago there was a reduction in the suburban service in and out of St. John.

The case of George H. Brooks, arrested on the charge of stealing money from the Purity Ice Cream Company while in their employ, was resumed in the police court yesterday afternoon. Michael Marcus was the only witness heard yesterday. He said that he had heard the accused money on Sept. 20, 1920, for some ice cream the latter had brought him and also for a balance that he had owed from another day. The accused was remanded.
