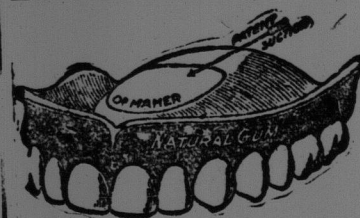

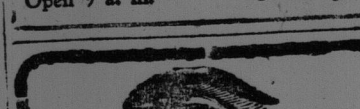

Provincial Bank Fosters This
Branch of Its Business—
Attractive Calendars—Re-

Following their long established cus-

fact, a policy of special attention to this
department has recently been inaugu-
rated. Every depositor now coming to the
bank is given a small card expressing
the appreciation of the directors for the
patronage granted and soliciting the
influence of everyone towards inducing
their friends to open a savings account
with the bank.

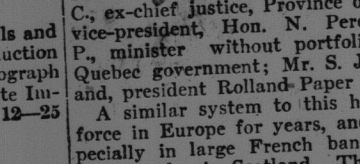
Since its foundation in 1900 the Pro-
vincial Bank has always taken particu-
lar care of its savings department. Great
facilities as well as efficient protection
have always been given to depositors.
This bank is the only one in Canada
having established for the control of its
savings department a committee of ex-
perts, who examine monthly the invest-
ments made in connection with the sav-
ings department. This committee is
composed of the following gentlemen:
President, Hon. Sir Alex. Lacoste, K.
C., ex-chief Justice, Province of Quebec;
vice-president, Hon. S. J. B. Ross,
Quebec government; Hon. J. B. R.

A similar system to this has been in
force in Europe for years, and more es-

stitutions. An evident proof of this con-

ada, in January, 1919, and May, 1920,
issued in a very short time were over-

Deposits of any amount are accepted
in our savings department, and in order
to fully accommodate everyone, even \$1

deposit balances, however small they
may be, carry interest at the rate of 3 p.
per annum, payable on June 30th and
December 31st of each year. All de-
