SPENDS \$11,000 ON PLAYGROUNDS

Ten Grounds, Four Pools and Three Rinks—Ottawa's Fine Record

(Toronto Globe.)

"For, Day, my holiday, if thou ill-usest Me, who am only Pippa..."

The days of this effulgent summer bring so many stories of child life crushed in the streets that all organized effort to provide playground facilities for children should be part of the glad tidings of peace. Bugles will blow out today over the rich dead, who, dying, have made us rarer gifts than gold. "These laid the world away; poured out the red."

Sweet wine of youth; gave up the years to be Of work and joy, and that unhop'd serene, That men call age, and those who would have been. Their sons, they gave, their immortality."

The necessities of modern life should include the conservation of life, and experiment is proving that if only something of the noble idealism of those who gave their merry youth to the country and for God" be applied to this momentous problem, something worth while may be done.

During the last seven years there has developed a playground movement in Ottawa that now embraces 20,000 children for whom have been provided not only suitable and beautiful playgrounds in different parts of the city, but also more than thirty instructors, who organize and supervise the play, and thus make it intelligent and educative as well as interesting and physically beneficial. The object of the promoters, aside from the provision of safe and beautiful playgrounds, is to teach children to play in the proper spirit. Their motto is: "It's not to win or lose, but how to play the game."

The local Council of Women were responsible for the conception and inception of the movement. In the first year of its existence, 1912, the attendance at the playgrounds was 400. This year it is 20,000. There are now ten supervised playgrounds, four swimming pools, and three skating rinks. In the first year the work was under the control of the local Council of Women. In the following year a playgrounds association was formed, with a grant from the city of \$1,000. The grant for 1919 is \$11,000. In 1914 the control passed into the hands of a committee formed of members of the Playgrounds Association and members of the city council. In the first year the work was supported by private subscription, but is now entirely financed by the city council. The movement has not escaped opposition and antagonism, says the director, W. J. Neale, but all this has now disappeared. The necessity to make the modern city safe for children is so obvious; the happiness of all concerned is so patent; the civilizing and educative effect of supervised play is so convincing.

"I will pass each and see their happiness," said Pippa on the day of her momentous holiday. Visitors to the capital might do worse. On these lovely summer mornings they would see the children busy with their modelling, their peg-board work, their singing games, their sand games, all in the open air—House of God. There are fifty-two baseball teams, volley ball teams, football teams, and croquet all properly organized and supervised, and there have been no accidents during the seven years of operation.

Mrs. Nichols was in the thorough-out the north end and her death will be mourned by a large circle of friends.
