Live Stock and the War.

Never before could one look ahead and
be so certain of the future of the live
stock business. Since the first blood was
spilled upon European soil grain prices
have doubled and quadrupled, cattle
doubled, hogs tripled, and sheep quad-
rupled. The whole world is our market.

Millions of men who were pro-
ducers a few months ago are now sol-
diers, depending upon the farms to feed
them. The live stock farmer has a
double chance. If climatic conditions
limit his grain crop, he still has animals
upon which he can fall back for remun-
eration. If he has soft corn, poor hay,
no wheat, light oats or some other crop
failure, he can still depend upon his ani-
mals to use what he has produced to
the best advantage. If he were compelled
to market his live stock or moly he

POTATO SPRAYING

Of all operations conducted on the
farms it is probably that spraying po-
tatoes is the most profitable. In fact
when one considers that the increased
crop of potatoes is about 15 per cent
at a cost of about \$15, is about 100
bushels, it becomes apparent that the
extra crop is well worth the investment.
It can be relied upon to give the greatest
returns of any open to farmers at least
potato spraying. It is equivalent to
buying potatoes at fifteen cents per
bushel and it is more than probable that
the extra crop will be more than 100
bushels. The normal crop of potatoes in
the Maritimes during 1918-19. Experi-
ments carried on by the laboratory
of the Dominion Entomological Labora-
tory at Annapolis Royal, N. S., in 1917
show that an acre of potatoes at the
height of the growing season will pro-
duce about 8 bushels of potatoes per
day. The potato being mostly starch is
made up almost wholly of materials that
are absorbed from the air by leaf and
not from the soil. As soon as the top dies
the potato is in the form of potato tuber
starch. Unsprayed potatoes are likely to
be attacked by the normal crop of tuber
is from one-third to one-half stored,
and as soon as the tops are killed by
the blight the storage of tubers ceases.
Spraying with Bordeaux will protect
potatoes absolutely from blight. When
the normal crop of tubers is from
one-third to one-half stored, and as soon

Bordeaux will protect potato plants ab-
solutely from blight and will result in a
normal season in keeping the tops green
from ten to fifty days longer than
normal. Keeping the tops green for
only three days will result in fifteen
bushels more potatoes per acre or more
than the value of fifteen dollars, and if
five dollars, cost of labor as well as ma-
terials included.

In view of the shortage of food and
the normal scarcity of potatoes in 1918
it is but little short of a crime for a
man to neglect the thorough spraying
of his potatoes. The tops are killed and
thoroughly sprayed five times means in a
normal season one hundred bushels
more potatoes, and this year the coun-
try needs the potatoes.

Potatoes should be sprayed when
about eight inches high with a poisoned
Bordeaux mixture, repeat every ten
days or two weeks until the tops are
done growing. Make sure that all parts
of the plant, the tops and undersides of
the leaves and the stems are thoroughly
wet with the mixture.

To make Bordeaux mixture, dissolve
4 pounds of bluestone in 20 gallons of
water and slake in another barrel
pounds of stone lime making it up later
to 20 gallons of milk of lime. Pour the
two by alternate buckets into the spray
barrel and add the poison. In using
hydrated lime, dissolve the 4 pounds of
copper sulphate or bluestone in 40 gal-
lons of water and add 5 pounds of hy-
drated lime stirring rapidly all the while.
As a poison one can use any of the
following they being arranged in order
of value, present prices considered. To
40 gallons use: 1-1/2 lbs. arsenate of
lime powder, 2 lbs. crystal arsenate of
soda, 1 lb. fused arsenate of soda, 1-1/2
lbs. arsenate of zinc powder, 4 lbs. arse-
nate of lead paste, 2 lbs. arsenate of lead
powder, or 1 lb. paris green.
