Nearly 200 feet of the railroad was blown up.

PUBLIC NOTICE
PUBLIC NOTICE is hereby given by the City of Saint John that at a meeting of the Common Council thereof held on the Twelfth day of May, A.D. 1913, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

"RESOLVED that the paving of that portion of King Street from King Street to Princess Street is necessary and that in the public interest such paving should be done, and further:

"RESOLVED that the Common Clerk publish a Notice of the passing of this resolution and also an estimate of approximate cost per lineal foot of such paving, as required under Section 1, Sub-section (b) of the Act of Assembly 7 Edward 7, Chapter 87, Intituled 'An Act relating to the paving of Streets in the City of Saint John.'"

AND in accordance with the provision of Section 1, Sub-section (b) of the Act of Edward VII, Chapter 87, notice is also hereby given that it is estimated that the approximate cost per lineal foot of such paving is \$14.80, and that the owners of the rateable land fronting on the sidewalk of said Street (or portion of Street), proposed to be paved, will be assessed and compelled to pay for the one-half of the cost of so paving such Street, viz.—\$7.40 per lineal foot approximately for each owner's frontage on said Street, provided all ways that said City will itself pay the cost of so paving the portions of the Street that includes such portions as cross another Street.

AND NOTICE is also hereby given that after the publication of this notice as required by the said Act, the City may proceed to perform the work of paving the Street (or portion of Street), mentioned in the said resolution unless within one month after such publication of this notice a petition signed by the same being done is presented to the City by the owners representing more than one-third of the portion of the real and rateable frontage on the sidewalk of said Street (or portion of Street), so proposed to be paved.

SEES GROWTH OF TRADE WITH AUSTRALIA
Visitor to St. John from Sydney Speaks of Proposed Agreement

That the projected trade agreement with Australia now pending would mean a vast increase in business between Canada and that country and serve to promote better commercial relations, was the statement made this morning by H. Frothingham, Sydney, Australia, who arrived here today and is at the Royal Hotel.

He said the merchants and manufacturers there were looking forward to the agreement with the feeling that both countries would benefit, and having seen the trade between New Zealand and Canada had prospered since the enactment of the improved trade bill, they had every reason to believe that in the case of their own country similar results would accrue.

Mr. Frothingham is a Canadian who has been in Sydney for about ten years. Buyers in Australia, he said, today considered England first, and Canada second, in their trade dealings, and their strong desire was for the preference to Britain and her dominions, even though there was a possibility of advantageous dealings with foreign centres. Australia wanted a wider market, and it was natural that Canada should also, to the enactment of a reciprocal agreement as to better trade relations would probably result in a greater volume of business, and this, he said, it was natural that St. John should benefit exceedingly if it came about. Already Australia trade through this port in the winter season was quite extensive and it was only reasonable to expect that there would be still more with a reciprocal enactment passed. The advantages offered here as a shipping centre would naturally appeal to both exporters and importers.

INJUNCTION TALK RE MUNICIPAL HOME MATTER

County Council Action of Yesterday Causes General Comment in the City Today

The whole city was talking this morning about the action of the county council in deciding to give an option on the Municipal Home property for \$75,000 after refusing \$100,000 only three months ago. If the property was considered worth more than \$100,000 three months ago the citizens in general were at a loss to understand why it is worth only half that amount today.

While there may have been some development committee of the building on account of the blasting it could not be estimated at this amount. Whatever might happen to the building the blasting could not affect the value of the land, and it is estimated, on the basis of previous sales of surrounding tracts, that the land would be worth very much more.

The explanations given at the council meeting yesterday are not generally accepted as sufficient to satisfy the questions which have arisen in the minds of the citizens and today the matter is the subject of much comment around the streets.

There was talk this morning of an injunction being secured to prevent the council putting into effect its decision to grant the option at the figure named.

MUNICIPAL COAL MINE FOR CALGARY
Calgary, May 14—The power and development committee of the city council is considering the advisability of purchasing a municipal coal mine, and tenders for coal property requested by the city council have been received by the city clerk. Several good properties at various distances from Calgary, not exceeding 100 miles, are offered the city at prices ranging from \$125,000 to \$600,000. All these properties will be investigated at once by the committee.
