MANY ASSEMBLED IN LAST TRIBUTE TO REV. L. G. MACNEILL

Funeral of Former Pastor of St. Andrew's Held This Afternoon—St. Andrew's Society Resolution

A large number of people from all walks in life attended the funeral of Rev. L. G. MacNeill and paid their last tribute of respect to the departed minister this afternoon. A short service was held at half past two at his home, 127 Duke street, after which the funeral procession was formed and the body taken to St. Andrew's church, of which Rev. Mr. MacNeill was for long the pastor. Members of St. Andrew's Society attended the funeral in a body and marched near the head of the procession to the church.

At the church the prayer of invocation was read by Rev. J. A. McKelvie, a portion of Scripture was read by Rev. James Ross and Rev. J. H. A. Anderson led in prayer. An address was given by Rev. James H. MacVicar, who gave an account of the life work of the departed. He referred to the distinctions in his college career and gave particularly those which he wished him success in his new position.

During the service the hymns "Now The Laborer's Task Is O'er" and "The Sands Of Time Are Sinking Fast" were sung by the choir. The pall bearers were Hon. J. G. Forbes, Dr. P. R. Inehes, W. C. Whittaker, A. L. Law, William Murdoch and B. R. Macaulay. The floral offerings were very beautiful and numerous. Among them was a wreath from the elders and trustees of St. Andrew's church and a cross of roses from the Ladies' Aid Society of the church. There was also a pillow of roses from the sons of the deceased. Interment was in Fernhill.

The trustees of St. Andrew's church at a meeting last evening, passed the following resolution:—Whereas, the Reverend Leander G. MacNeill, for seventeen years the beloved pastor of St. Andrew's church in the city of St. John, in the province of New Brunswick, departed this life on the 14th day of October, the twenty-seventh anniversary of his induction into the pastorate of the said church, and Whereas, during the many years of his pastorate, from which position he retired in A. D. 1866 on account of physical infirmity, he ever gave his best efforts to the promotion of the cause of Christ in this community, and Whereas, during his long pastorate, by his strong, manly and courageous conduct, his ready sympathy with those in distress, his faithful attention to the onerous duties devolving upon him, and by his vigorous efforts for the cause of righteousness in this city, he greatly endeared himself, not only to the members of his congregation, but also to the greater portion of the community at large.

Resolved, that we, the trustees of St. Andrew's church, in a special session assembled, do hereby record our sense of the great loss sustained, both by St. Andrew's church and by the city of St. John, by the death of Mr. MacNeill, and extend to Mrs. MacNeill and the other members of his family our assurance of our deepest sympathy for their loss in this sad hour of their bereavement, and Further resolved that a copy of these resolutions be sent to his family and placed on record in the Minute Book of this church.

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JUDGE HOLDS THAT THE GRAND MANAN WAS RESPONSIBLE

Decision in Important Collision Case Is Given in Portland

Judge Hale holds that the steamer Grand Manan was solely at fault for the collision with Dredge No. 4 of the Bay State Dredging Co., in the St. Croix river on June 28, 1912, in an opinion filed in the United States court in Portland. Fritz H. Jordan was appointed assessor to determine the damages in the several cases arising out of this collision.

The cases involved are the Bay State Dredging Co. vs. Steamer Grand Manan, Grand Manan Steamship Co., claimant for the damages to the barge; Frank Silver et als, vs. Steamer Grand Manan Grand Manan Steamboat Co., claimant for the loss of the crew's effects; Daniel E. Warren, administrator of the estate of Capt. Carey of the barge, vs. Grand Manan Steamboat Co., for the captain's death and a cross bill for the Grand Manan Steamboat Co., vs. Bay State Dredging Co.

The plaintiffs in the first three cases were represented by Blodgett, Jones, Burnham & Bingham of Boston, and T. F. McAmey of Boston, and the Bay State Dredging Co., was represented by Benjamin Thompson of Portland, Edward F. Dodge of Boston and George J. Clark of St. Stephen, N. B.

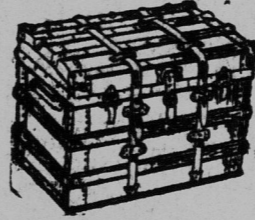
ST. JOHN IS NOT ALONE
