Construction Committee

The construction committee presented its sixteenth annual report as follows, through G. S. Fisher, chairman:—

Last winter the two permanent men were employed in hauling muck from the bog and delivering it at the sides of the drives and walks from which materials had been taken for road building, etc. In the spring when the ice had left Lily Lake the usual work of fitting the various wire divisions for the fowl was attended to. Then the drives and walks were put in proper repair. The muck mentioned was then spread in the old gravel pits and unsightly places. Grass seed was then sown and has grown and very much improved the general appear.

The walks and it took several days to put it back. The gravel being short, I had some sods taken out of a place on the lawn and some taken form the walks, for levelling purposes.
