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"BUGS" RAYMOND. Wonderful in Physique and Strength, a Great Pitcher, But Too Erratic. Arthur I. Raymond, who was found kicked to death in a Chicago hotel in a few days, was known as "Bugs" on account of his eccentricity. He was a comparatively young man. He was a member of the New York National League pitching staff for two years, 1908 to 1910, and was regarded as one of the greatest and speediest pitchers that ever lived. He was a man of wonderful physique and strength, but exceedingly erratic, owing to his habits.
