WOODSTOCK, ONTARIO
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ROGERS IS OUTSPOKEN.

He Discusses the Railway Rate Case
in Election Speech.

Winnipeg, Oct. 9.—Feeling is in-
tense in Macdonald constituency and
with only three more days of cam-
paigning both parties are waxing
warm to the fray, each claiming a vic-
tory in sight.

At a meeting in St. James in the
Conservative candidate's interest,
Hon. Robert Rogers made the positive
statement that freight rates would be
reduced as the result of the present
enquiry.

Mr. Rogers also dealt with the is-
sue of C.P.R. stock, stating that the
Government had not as yet dealt with
the application of the Canadian Pacific
Railway, but it was his opinion that
were the C.P.R. watching the
progress of the west as closely as it
should do, they would be asking for
ten times sixty millions to keep pace
with the transportation requirements
that the progress of Western Canada
will require in the next few years.
He added that he would favor any
such request.

paign are Premier Roblin, Hon. Robt.
Rogers, Hon. Dr. Roche, and Dr.
Schaffner, while leading campaigners
for the L. Richardson's behalf are Dr.

Rogers' Promise Causes Talk.

Ottawa, Oct. 9.—Hon. Robert Rogers' assurance to the electors of Mac-
donald's constituency that freight
rates will be reduced is causing con-
siderable comment here among the
railway men gathered here for the in-
quiry by the Railway Commission into
the question of western freight
charges. There is a tendency to scoff
at Hon. Mr. Rogers' promise of redress
to shippers, coming as it does at a
time when the question before the
board. The proceedings have not yet
reached a stage where a prediction of
the outcome can be ventured, as
there is a mass of evidence to be
gone into, to be followed by further
sessions in the east and west. More-
over, unless the hints of F. H. Chris-
ler, counsel for the C.P.R., have creat-
ed a false impression, the company,
in the event of an adverse finding,
will fight the case right through to the
Privy Council.

DEFYING THE LAW.

Whitney Says School Regulations
Will Be Enforced.

Toronto, Oct. 9.—"I am surprised
at the inaccurate statements now be-
ing made concerning the new regula-
tions affecting English and French
schools," said Sir James Whitney yester-
day. "These statements are un-
founded. They are intended to excite
the French-speaking people of Onta-
rio against the law. In some cases
school boards appear to have believ-
ed this false information and to have
passed resolutions advising the laws of
the province at defiance."

"To all resolutions based upon an
entire misunderstanding of the new
regulations, wish to make an em-
phatic and categorical denial that
there is anything unjust in the regu-
lations or that they are devised by
enemies of the French-speaking and
Roman Catholic people of Ontario."

"By the law each teacher is subject
to the Minister of Education, and
neither school boards nor any other
authority can interfere between Min-
ister and teacher. If any teacher re-
fuses to obey the regulations, the Min-
ister must suspend or cancel the cer-
tificate of such teacher. The law
also provides that any school board
which employs unqualified teachers
and does not comply with the in-
structions and regulations of the De-
partment, forfeits the legislative grant
and cannot lawfully pay its salaries
to such teachers any part of the taxes
levied for the support of the public
and separate schools under its charge."

"I also notice with regret that pu-
pils are being advised to leave school
if an English-speaking inspector en-
ters, although this, too, is a defiance
of the law and is quite contrary to
that courteous and kind civility for
which the French are famous. Under
the law the inspector, during his
visit, has full authority over the
school, and no one, either school
board or teacher, can interfere with
the pupils without incurring pen-
alties."

Objects to Flag Saluting.

London, Oct. 9.—(C.A.P. Cable.)—
The practice of school children salu-
ting the flag is criticised by a York
alderman the children of which city
have received a flag from York, West-
ern Australia.
The objecting alderman says that
many children go to school compul-
sory and therefore ought not to be
compelled to salute the flag except
with the unanimous consent of their
parents.
The lord mayor of York said that
the flag had been sent him as chief mag-
istrate and that he should send it to
each school for salutation.

New Radial Line to Galt.

Galt, Oct. 9.—According to plans
submitted to the Town Council by
the solicitor and chief engineer of
the Lake Erie Northern Railway, the
new electric road from Port Dover to
Galt, the route will be on the east side
of the Grand River from Brantford
Crossing on level G.T.R., a little south
of the depot, following State street to
Main street, and terminating at a
station of horses at Burns and
Sheppard's exchange. James Dikie,

War Now Going On

Montenegro Breaks Up the
Diplomatic Plans.

ALL EUROPE IS ANXIOUS
The Powers are Struggling to Prevent
the Hostilities From Spreading All
Over the Continent and Involving
Other Nations—Battle is Raging
on the Frontier—Turkey is
Invaded by the Allied Troops.

Constantinople, Oct. 9.—An official
despatch from the Montenegrin fron-
tier says that Montenegrins on Mon-
day attacked the Serbian frontier, and
laid waste to the village of Krasno-
Selo. Fifteen Turks were wounded.
The same day a large detachment of
the Montenegrin army crossed the
frontier in the Balkan range. A bat-
tle ensued, which, according to latest
reports, still continues. It is also
reported that the Turks surrounded
and annihilated one body of Monte-
negrin soldiers.

Berana Surrounded.

Paris, Oct. 9.—Montenegrin forces
early yesterday morning attacked Be-
rana, which at noon was completely
surrounded. Skirmishes also are re-
ported on the Serbian frontier, and
with Greek bands in the neighborhood
of Diskata. An exchange of shots has
occurred near Djumabala, on the Bulgar-
ian frontier.

General Fighting Expected.

Paris, Oct. 9.—A general conflict
in the Balkans is expected by offi-
cials here within 48 hours. Monte-
negrin's declaration of war against
Turkey is regarded merely as the be-
ginning. It is believed that the other
units in the Balkan coalition will
follow suit as soon as the mobiliza-
tion of their armies is complete. There
is only a faint hope now that the re-
presentations of the powers will avert
general hostilities.

Montenegro's Move is Considered in

Paris to be all a part of a pre-arranged
plan. It is asserted that Greece
was first selected by the Balkan coun-
cil for the purpose of forcing the issue and in-
augurate the war. This could easily
have been done by Greece seizing the
Greek Parliament the dispute
from Crete, which was certain
