Tokio, April 6.—1 p.m.—The imperial army headquarters, reporting to-day, says: "Part of our Kaiyuan force engaged in driving the enemy occupied Kuyuan, three miles northeast of Mienhaachie, on the afternoon of April 4th.

THE RUMORS OF PEACE IN RUSSIAN CAPITAL. St. Petersburg, April 6.—At the German embassy the statement that it had advised the foreign office that peace was probably concluded.

WHOLESALE POISONING. Number of Girls Employed in Cotton Mill Are in a Dangerous Condition.

Warsaw, April 6.—An extraordinary case of wholesale poisoning has occurred at a cotton mill in Fabianisz. Seventy girls in the coloring department were taken suddenly ill and fell to the floor unconscious.

THE TURKISH LOAN. Money Will Be Obtained in Germany to Pay for War Material.
