



## Nova Scotia Steel & Coal

Lower Iron Ore Beds at Wabana Found to be Practically Inexhaustible

Developments Show One of the Most Important Deposits Known-Quality Superior to That of Any Ore Uncovered on the Property-Lower Bed Seems Shaped Like a Saucer -Enough in Sight to Last Centuries.

(From Wall Street Journal.)

One of the most important discoveries made in recent years on any of the fron ore areas situated in Canada has been made during the past few months on the lower beds of the areas of the Nova Sectia Steel & Coal Co. at Webana. The results of these discoveries go to prove that Webana is undoubtedly one of the most important iron ore deposits in the world.

Scotia Co.'s submarine slopes driven seaward from the upper bed, and as the work advanced bore holes were sunk from the upper beds to the lower beds, in order that the company might have an opportunity of testing the quantity and qualify of the underlying ore. The results obtained from the last bore holes have been perfectly satisfactory, proving as they do that the big increase in thickness of the seam after it dips under the sea, as shown by the former bore holes, is fully maintained. This seam in the submarine areas is 20 to 30 feet-thick, as against 11 or 12 feet thick on the land.

What is most important, however, from the company's standpoint as also from the point of view of the shareholders, is that the
quality of the ore is far superior to anything previously found on the
company's deposits. The average from contents of the entire
thickness of the seam is over 55 p.c. This is 3 p.c. or 4 p.c.
higher than the results obtained from the previous bore holes.
In fact, some of the ore on the new seam shows as high as 53 p.c.
Perhaps even more important than the increased percentage of iron
in the ore is the decrease in the silicum. Previous tests of this
bed before it entered the areas of the Scotia Co. had shown as high

The average was 12 p.c. or 13 p.c., but in the last bore hole it was found that on the lower bed the silicum is down to about 9 p.c., which makes it nearly ideal for blast furnace purposes. The indications are that the ore will be of even better quality as it goes deeper.

While there was never any doubt as to the continuity of this lower bed, this last bore hole has proved that it extends for a further 1,000 feet in the Scotia areas. The submarine development thus shown that this lower bed in the Scotia holdings, which is approximately 20 feet thick, has so far been proven to be over 3,000 feet wide, sind its estimated length is about eight or ten miles. The lower bed is supposed to be shaped like a saucer, and at the present time the operators of the company have only crept down a very short distance along one of the rims towards the centre.
