





OTTAWA, June 2.—In the Senate this afternoon the following bills were siven a third reading: To amend the Canada Shipping Act. Respecting Signal Dues at Hallfax. Respecting Meaford Habor. Granting divorce to Hattle Spratte. The resolution will be forwarded to the Commons.
