LITTLE GIRL'S HARD LUCK IN MONTREAL

Parents Dead, Money Stolen by Bankers, She is Homeless and Without Friends... MONTREAL, Aug. 18.-Sent to a false address in Montreal from Burlington, Vt., Germaine Huck, twelve years, walked the streets without money, home or friends until she fell exhausted. She was taken in by a Councillor Mariel of Montreal, West. Her story is that her father died when she was young and left her mother well off. He was a doctor at St. Johns, P. Q. Her mother died three years ago and her money was put in the banque St. Jean of which Hon. P. H. Roy was president. The bank failed and she lost all, when the woman with whom she lived in Burlington found that she could get no more out of her, she sent her to Montreal without money and to a false address.

ALDERMEN WILL BE ABLE TO STUDY AGREEMENT

Printed Copies of Agreement With Government and Illustrative Blue Prints are Being Prepared... Copies of the agreement between the city and the Dominion government regarding the transfer of the harbor lots at West St. John are being printed and with blue prints showing the areas to be transferred, will be distributed among the aldermen. There has been considerable difficulty in securing the unanimous support of the aldermen to the terms of the transfer and this will give them all an opportunity to study the matter thoroughly and have their objections, if there are any, ready for the special meeting of the Common Council which will be called to deal with the matter.

REACH DECISION TOMORROW

LOPAZ, Bolivia, Aug. 18.-Senator Polo, the Peruvian minister to Bolivia, it is stated, has given the Bolivian congress until tomorrow to decide whether it will accept or reject Argentina's award in the boundary dispute between Peru and Bolivia, which was favorable to Peru.

BOY WAS KILLED BY KICK FROM A HORSE

Italian Had Both Legs Cut Off by a Derrick... PORT COLBORNE, Ont., Aug. 18.-Antonio Sartone, an Italian working at the cement works here, fell off a movable derrick and had both legs cut off above the knees. He was removed at once to Hospital, where he died later.

SPANIARDS, ON EVE OF FIGHT, CALLED ON TO BE HEROES

General Marina's Proclamation Foreshadows an Advance - King Alfonso Wants to Go to Front - Takes Active Interest in the Campaign... MADRID, Aug. 18.-King Alfonso is taking the keenest interest in the war in Morocco and all of Premier Mauria's influence is required to prevent him from going to the front. His Majesty writes daily to officers as Maletta, whom he knows personally. Neither King Alfonso nor any member of the royal household has participated in any entertainments or rejoicings since the war has been in progress and the social life of Madrid is almost at a standstill.

EXPECT TO BREAK ALL AVIATION RECORDS

Thirty Eight Machines Entered at Rheims... NEW YORK, Aug. 18.-Thirty-eight aeroplanes have been entered in the aviation competitions which commence next Sunday at Rheims, France, and further information said today that all records for long distance flights will fall. The names of the pilots for the various aeroplanes which will compete for the prizes have not yet been announced. Besides the valuable cups which have been offered for the events two hundred francs have been put up for prizes.
