### Commends Quebec Liquor Legislation

London, England, May 14. (Special to "The Madawaska") — Except in Quebec the regulations are faulty in that their operation favors drinking apart from eating, the consumption of spirits rather than wine, and do not secure sufficient supervision over that great disservice of quality which is a more important factor in the promotion of temperance states Lord Dawson, of Penn, Chief physician to His Majesty King George in an article in the Atlantic Monthly, Lord Dawson visited Canada this year with the British Medical Association and studied government liquor control in each province in Canada while here.

### Interesting Links In Canada's History

The first political boundary in the new world was established on paper in 1494 and is shown on Cantino's map of 1502. It ran north and south between Cape Breton and Newfoundland and separated the supposed possessions of the Spanish on the west from those of the Portuguese on the east. New Brunswick was therefore parcelled to Spain.

At that time the Melicite Indian tribe were lords of the Saint John river. Cadillac in 1692 referred to "Nashuaq, an Indian fort at St Anne's Point, where President now stands and Aupac, a village at the mouth of Springhill Brook and including Hartt and Savage Islands.

On Morris' map of the Saint John issued in 1765, appeared the following inscription: "An Island opposite Aughpack is about 7 miles above St. Anne's (Fredericton) and at this place was the Indian Church and the residence of the French missionary. The church and the other buildings themselves. An Island opposite Augh pack called Indian (Savage) Island, is the place where the Indians of Saint John make their annual rendez-vous on the island in their town consisting of about 40 houses.

It was interesting to note that in grading the Canadian Pacific Railway Indian bodies were dug up opposite the north of Savage Island on Mount Currie, where their burying ground lay. The great Indian Highway of those days was the Saint John and it was stated — in a report of 1793 that Indians delivered despatches from Quebec to the French Commander at the mouth of the Saint John in four days.

An excellent example of the modern map-makers' art is the new photolithographic map of Fredericton, showing every detail of this of the Canadian poets, Blas Carthage city that was the birthplace man and Charles G. D. Roberts. It has been the seat of government for the province since 1786 and emphasizes the new era of commerce and culture that has replaced the Arcadian paradise of the aborigines.
