POCKETBOOK

State of State Must Hand  
over Levis on Huge Sum

On Mass., Aug. 7.—That taxes

Province. Active groups of work-  
ers are arranging for cheap ac-  
commodations, and other com-  
mittees for providing meals, and still  
other committees are arranging for  
entertainment of different kinds  
on a lavish scale.

The day following, we will have  
with us H. R. H. the Prince of  
Wales, who visits Saint John first  
in his tour of Canadian cities, em-  
phasizing our position as an eastern  
gateway of the Dominion. This is  
another extraordinary event in our  
history, and by combining the two  
holidays, we feel assured we can  
make a visit to our busy city at this  
particular time very attractive in-  
deed, and Saint John—officially and  
through its homes—extends the  
heartiest kind of a welcome to the  
people of the Province to find their  
way here on the dates above men-  
tioned if they can possibly manage  
to do so.

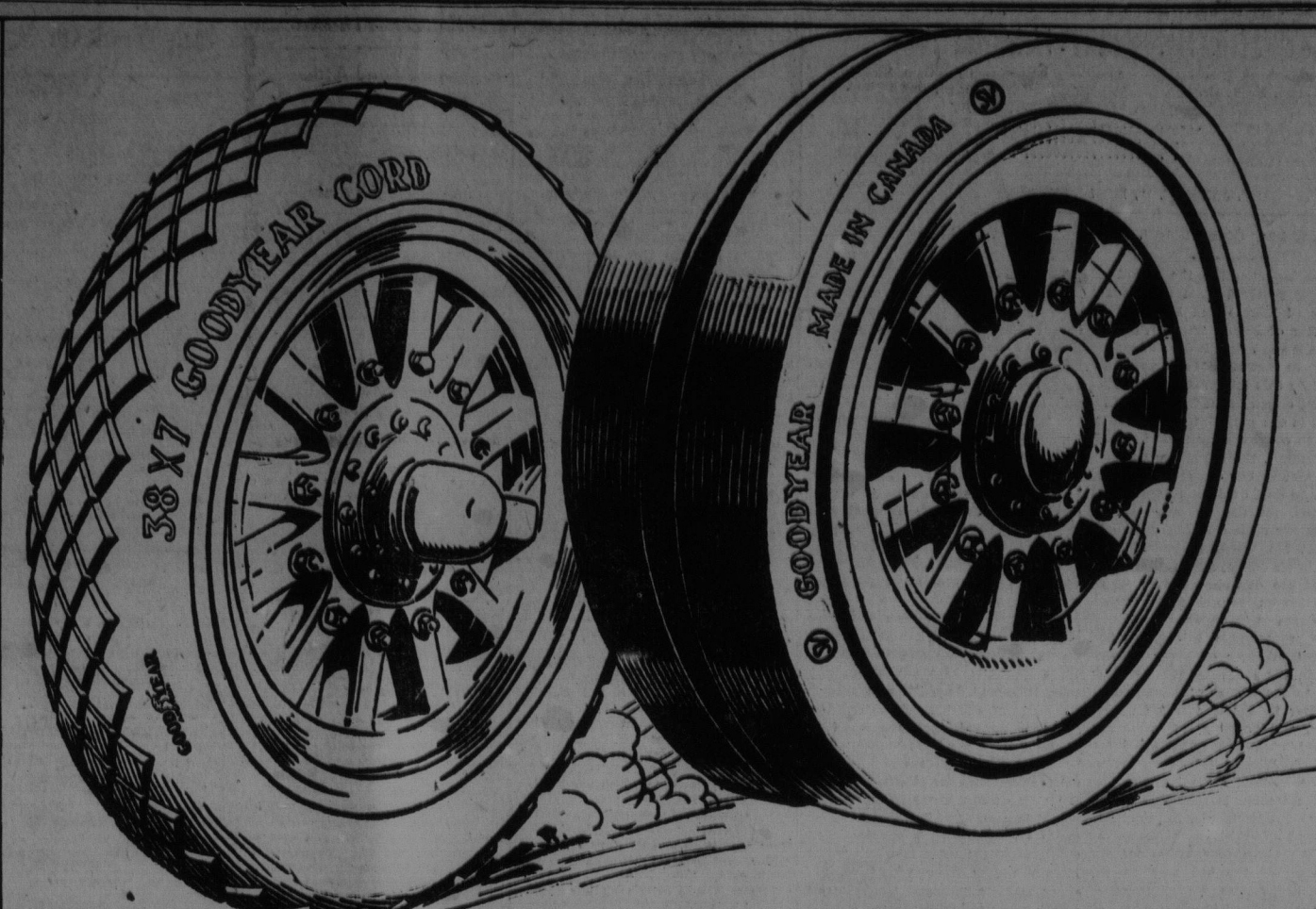
