South American Heavyweight

Luis A. Firpo, the Champion, is Soon to Visit the United States.

Buenos Ayres, Aug. 14.—Luis A. Firpo, South American heavyweight boxing champion, is soon to visit the United States, where he will seek the advantages to be derived from good trainers and expert management. Firpo weighs 213 pounds. His title was gained by defeating boxers in Chile and other South American countries. In a match in Buenos Ayres in June, he knocked out Antonio Jiran, who styles himself the "Czechoslovak champion," in the first three minute round of a scheduled 10 round bout. Firpo has a considerable ring history and before taking up boxing was a professional Greco-Roman wrestler.

Another United States Record

Man o' War, Champion Three Year Old, Went Mile and Half in 2.28 4-5.

New York, Sept. 12.—Man o' War, champion three-year-old, made an other United States track record Saturday, when he won the Jockey Club stakes at Belmont Park, one mile and a half in 2.28 4-5. The best previous for the distance, 2.33 5-5, was made by Thunderclap at Laurel, Md., last year. The futurity, guaranteed \$30,000, of which \$1,750 went to the breeders for two-year-olds, was won by Step Lightly, Star Viceroy, owned by J. K. L. Ross, Montreal, was second.

Englishman Held The Advantage

Philadelphia, Sept. 12.—The Inco nito cricket eleven of England held the advantage at the end of the second day's play in the match with the all-Philadelphia team of the Merion Cricket Club, Haverford, Saturday. The British players made 336 runs in their first innings and the Philadelphians 208. The visitors in their second turn at bat scored forty runs for the loss of four wickets when stumps were drawn. The match will be continued tomorrow. C. C. Morris, Philadelphia, was top scorer with 102.

Fern Hal The Big Noise At Presque Isle

Wins the Free-For-All, the Race Going to Six Heats—Lady Grattan Close Contender.

Presque Isle, Me., Sept. 11.—With out a doubt the greatest day's racing ever seen on Presque Isle track ended at 5.50 p.m. today, with Northern Belle winning the fifth and deciding heat of the 2.25 pace.

The free-for-all pacers went a grueling race of six heats. The old reliable Fern Hal, owned by Dr. D. H. McAllister, Sussex, N. B., and driven by the popular provincial driver, Fred Cameron, winning the fourth, fifth and sixth heats. Lady Grattan was the winner of the first two heats, and was the contending horse in every heat but the third, in which she made a break on the upper turn and finished fifth. Putvin, her driver, made claim of interference by Nelson, driver of the Problem, which was not allowed. The sixth and last heat was one of the best contested heats ever seen on any track. Fern Hal went away a neck ahead of Lady Grattan and both mares raced the whole mile side by side. The battle through the stretch was won traveling miles to see. Both drivers used every art known to them and both mares responded nobly, but the old black mare was not to be denied and poked her nose in front at the wire, not more than half a head in advance of the dainty and game Lady Grattan.

The 2.30 trot was won in straight heats by Miss Peter Spat, driven by Gerow. The 2.14 trot and pace in straight heats by Sadie Ashbourne, after being splendidly driven by her owner, John Seelye, of Presque Isle; 2.25 pace went five heats, Garrison, of Roadstown, N. J., landing the daughter of the Northern Man, Northern Belle, ahead in the second, third and fifth heats.

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Limitation of Horse Racing

Much Betting at Buenos Aires Track—May Only Have One Meet Per Week.

Buenos Aires, Aug. 14.—President Irigoyen's administration a consideration of law for the suppression or limitation of horse racing, it is announced. Buenos Aires has one of the finest race courses in the world operated by its famous Jockey Club where millions of pesos change hands in a year under the pari mutuel betting system.

Races are held twice a week, Thursdays and Sundays, and on the frequent holidays. The attendance is from 15,000 to 20,000 persons. The newspapers have commented on the fact that, as a corollary to the mounting cost of living, the betting public has increased its wagers on the races. Wagers total bets on a Sunday were formerly 500,000 pesos, but now sometimes aggregate 2,000,000 pesos.

Famous Contest Goes to 100 to 6 Shot at Doncaster.

London, Sept. 12.—Caligula, 100 to 6 today won the great St. Leger race, 8 to 1, was second, and Mantion, 33 to 1, was third.

Fourteen horses ran. The victory of Lord Willton's Caligula in the list of the "classic" races at Doncaster today was a great surprise to the racing public, but he has been consistently fancied by his stable since when last June at Ascot he won the Ascot Derby stakes of a mile and a half in decisive fashion, beating, among others, Orpheus, second favorite today.

Comes of Long List
Caligula adds another victory to the long list of winnings of the produce of his famous sire the Tetrach, his dam being Snoot. The feature of the favorite, Spion Kop, was a great disappointment to the public, whose faith in the Derby winner never faltered.

Sir Edward Hulton's Silvern, a bay colt by Polytechnic-Silver Fowl, and third favorite, ran into second place, while a rank outsider, Lady Douglas' Mantion, who started at 33 to 1, finished third. The result completely reverses three-year-old form for the season.
