The Latest Duel. The latest advices from Hong Kong give pain at Hong Kong, and Mr. Torre Bueno, Peruvian Consul at Macao. The origin of the dispute seems to have been some insulting expressions which were used in refer ce to certain card debts, and which Mr Torse Bueno considered wounding to his dignity as a gentleman. He therefore sent challenge to Mr. Checa, choosing the rapier, a weapon of which he is reputed to master. Mr. Torre Bueno, however, replied that his right arm was too weak for sword play, and requested that the pistol (in the handling of which he is known to be proficient) might be substituted. The principals, their seconds, and two medical gentlemen (Spanish), with some others holding official positions, reached the ground in due order and at the appointed time. The ground was measured off, and Mr. Torre Bueno won the toss for the first shot at twenty-five paces. At the signal, he fired and missed. Mr. Checa then fired at twenty-two paces, and likewise missed. Torre Bueno then fired his second shot at nineteen paces, and again failed to hit, as did also Mr. Checa at sixteen paces, was very close, almost grazing Mr. Checa's nose, but it fortunately went clear. Mr. Checa then exclaimed, "You see, gentlemen, that he intends to kill me! he is aiming at my head. I would gladly fire in the air, but I he intends to kill me! he is aiming at my head.
