Mr. Edward Shillington, who went west last March and who has since been employed in the vicinity of Pense, Sask., returned home on Saturday, summoned here by the serious illness of his father, Mr. Henry Shillington.  
The Presbytery of Lanark and Renfrew met at Middleville yesterday, the 2nd inst., at 11 a.m., for the induction of Rev. Andrew Drysdale, late of White Lake, into the charge of Middleville, Darling and Poland. A very interesting service was held.  
Mr. James Pepper received a telegram yesterday conveying the sad news of the death of his grandson, Mr. Arthur Wilson, which occurred suddenly Monday night at Detroit, Mich. Deceased, who was about 28 years of age, resided in Lanark some fifteen years ago when his mother conducted the bakery now owned by Mr. Bates, but since leaving here has been a resident of Detroit. Arthur was an only son. Two sisters, both married, survive. He is also survived by his mother, now Mrs. Butler. They have the sympathy of many Lanark friends in their bereavement.  
Lieut. Edwin C. McNeil, son of R. C. McNeil, clerk in the Senate at Washington, D.C., and one of the Lanark old boys who attended the re-union here two years ago, was married on Oct. 16th, to Miss Mary McKay of New York. The young couple will reside in Brooklyn, N.Y.

### ALMONTE.

Dr. Metcalfe has so far recovered from his recent illness that he was able to return home from the R.M. Hospital on Monday.  
Mr. Hugh Bowland has not yet received his commission as registrar for North Lanark, and Dr. P. C. McGregor is still in charge of the office.  
Edmund E. Tennant, committed to the county gaol from Carleton Place six months ago on a charge of forgery, came before the county judge last Saturday, and through his counsel, Mr. W. H. Stafford, pleaded guilty, offered to enlist, and was allowed off on suspended sentence. He is now wearing the King's colors, and will have an excellent chance to redeem his name. Tennant is a member of one of Lanark County's finest families, and his Honor Judge Scott solved a difficult case in a way that seems to have general approval.  
As Mr. Herb Coxford was driving on Malcom street on Sunday evening he was run into by a motor cycle upon which three young men were riding, and the front wheel of his buggy was badly damaged. In the buggy with him was his wife and son and Mrs. Wm. Scott, all of whom were thrown out, but none of them seriously hurt. The cyclists were running without a headlight, and were unseen by Mr. Coxford until they were right on to the buggy. The motor cycle was also put out of service. The motor cycle riders were given a choice between a fine and paying damages for the buggy and they chose the latter, which cost them \$18. They were from Ottawa.

Hon. W. T. White, Finance Minister, announced that the new domestic war loan would be issued at the end of this month, and estimated Canada's war expenditure for the next fiscal year at \$250,000,000.

Mr. Robertson in his report stated there was too many pupils late for school and asked for some action by the Board.  
Mr. J. M. Brown offered the Board the use of a bell which could be hung in the belfry of the Central School and could be heard anywhere in town.  
The Mayor and members of the Municipal Council being present the Chairman now introduced the matter of having the Council submit a Bylaw to raise \$3,500.00 for a new High School.  
The Chairman reviewed the situation of the Board in connection with the Department of Education, and the matter was fully gone into by Messrs. Findlay and Riddell. The subject was very fully discussed, both members of the Board and Council participating in the discussion. While the Council were in favor of a new building, the question of financing the amount required at the present was a very serious one, and they would look to the Board to give the ratepayers all information possible.  
Board now adjourned.

French troops are expected soon to effect a junction with the Serbian army, following their defeat of the Bulgarians. Nine hundred Irishmen were attacked on the docks in Liverpool when they attempted to take passage to New York. The Fifty Thousand Dollar Club to raise money for patriotic purposes in small amounts was organized in Toronto. Magistrate Langeller, of Quebec, strongly deprecated animosity between French and English speaking Canadians. Since August the St. John Red Cross has used 52,000 yards of material in making garments for wounded soldiers. The body of Richard Andrews, mining prospector, sixty years of age, was found in a boom of logs in the river near Dryden. There were 100,000 fewer visitors to the London Zoological Gardens last year than during the previous twelve months. "Mica Bran" is being manufactured by some United States factories. It is used for concrete facing work to produce rock effect. Seventeen more municipalities have undertaken to raise new regiments, and a large number of county battalions have been offered. A ample supply of winter clothing for Canadian troops in England and training in Canada is assured by the Militia Department officials. Over \$1,000,000 in cash has been raised by the Canadian Red Cross Society, according to a statement by President Noel Marshall. The lighthouse keeper's cottage at Burnt Island, occupied by James Acton and family, was burned to the foundation walls Sunday evening. The building and contents are reported a total loss. Following the lead of H.R.H. the Duke of Connaught, who is to be the first subscriber to the new Canadian war loan, the Mayor and Board of Control, of Ottawa, decided that \$500,000 of the city's sinking funds should be invested in the loan. Sir Wilfred T. Grenfell, the "pastor of Labrador," announced that he will leave soon with the Harvard unit of Red Cross workers for active service in France. Dr. Grenfell will spend his missionary furlough working in some French or British hospital.

## 'FOOD PRICES UNBEARABLE.

German Socialist Organ Enters Despairing Protest.

BERLIN, Nov. 8, via London.—The Vorwaerts, organ of the German Social Democratic party, purchases a large column prominence from the executive committee of the Social Democratic party, declaring that the Government measure thus far for the regulation of the food supplies and prices are only half measures. It demands the adjusting of prices of foodstuffs so as to eliminate war profits, both wholesale and retail.  
The pronouncement begins as follows:—  
"The rise in the prices of foodstuffs has become unbearable. The prices of all important provisions and other articles of daily necessity, such as fuel, clothing, and footwear, have reached an exorbitant height. With anxious fears the people of the laboring class and up to the circles of the middle classes look forward to approaching winter. Already bitter want rules in many families. Must there be such selfish lust for gain and capitalist greed of profits rage unrestrainedly in the unrelieved free play of forces? Must millions be in want so that those shameless producers and dealers who coolly take advantage of war conditions can enrich themselves at the nation's cost?"  
The pronouncement answers the foregoing questions in the negative. It says that the foodstuffs on hand are adequate, but they must be right distributed. The prices for swine just established, it claims, are too high and beef prices are not regulated.  
The committee demands in addition to the fixing of prices for other foodstuffs also "a distribution of the foodstuffs on hand in equal rations among all the empire's inhabitants, as is done with bread, in order to avoid preferential treatment of the rich who are able to pay."
