### "Hop Off" Expected to Occur for Weather Conditions

Weather Conditions Ocean Have Improved

#### RIVAL AIRMEN PREEN THEIR WINGS

ST. JOHNS, Nfld., April 27.—The trans-Atlantic airplane race expected to start from St. John's some time this afternoon.

Reports received here this morning were that weather conditions over the ocean were favorable, and that Frederick P. Raynham British aviator, and Harry E. Hawker, his rival, each had his belongings packed and the wings of his machine preened this morning for flight that evening.

### Sir William Meredith Summing up

#### The Liquor Inquiry Matter.

#### ACCEPTS MR. AYEARS' STATEMENT

(Special To THE RECORD)

TORONTO April 27.—"I have no hesitation," said Sir William Meredith at the conclusion of his investigation of the charges against the Ontario Liquor Board, "in coming to the conclusion that only were the charges not proved they were disproved. I believe Mr. Ayeard, the chief inspector, who has been suspended, has led an honorable life and to be a zealous and faithful public servant. I thought it better to state this statement now at the conclusion of the investigation rather than in order that Mr. Ayeard might receive the benefit of his public trial. The ultimate tribunal of course is the public and they will be the final judge as for me I have no hesitation in affirming the correctness of my judgment."

"It is surprising to me that any should suggest that a man of Mr. Ayeard's character would come and commit perjury and get out of a superior officer to borrow money from his subordinate."

"I think it is disapproved that agreement was ever entered into between Mr. Ayeard and Hinch Solomon to share in the money won by the latter received from the Detective agency. It is established to my satisfaction that Mr. Ayeard never entered into any hope of share in the money and I find that he never was an agreement that he should share. I also find it was contemplated by Hinch and Solomon to give Ayeard one third of the money which was probably non-existent under the impression, Solomon had had his own reason for not deceiving his chief. I find that an agreement was made to Mr. Ayeard and he refused to the any part of the money."

"I entirely discredit the evidence of Duncanson as to the manner in which he said he employed Solomon Hinch. I think that it was a clever thing for Ayeard to allow to work with Duncanson's agency, enabled them to allow his men to make men in illicit liquor business through conductors on trains. This is nothing unusual in allowing him to do his work."

"I accept the statement of Solo that the money was intended to be kept together. The money was deposited with an agreement with Ayeard, with a clear understanding that there was nothing in the statement that the fees were deposited for Ayeard's benefit. Ayeard had told them they would not take the money and personally made a present of it to Solo and Hinch. It is suggested that Solo got his share. No doubt, what happened the money was withdrawn from the account under circumstances to which Ayeard testified."

"Then regarding the \$4000 do I find there was a division made why in name of common sense didn't Ayeard withdraw his share and put it in private account?"

"Two sums were returned by Ayeard to the special accounts after the explosion in the house. It has been conceivable that Ayeard, if he was wrong would have put the money back after the Dewar charges. suggestion of perjury that Mr. Kay tried to impress on me is surprising to me.
