ONTARIO MEMBERS SAY NEW TEMPERANCE BILL WILL HURT HEARST'S CHANCES

ADDING THAT HE HAS PLENTY TROUBLE NOW (Special to The Record)
OTTAWA, Oct. 9.—This has been a session of caucuses, many of them of unusual interest but today's meeting of Unionist members is the unusual of all. It is a caucus forced upon the government by Ontario members, mainly consisting of Conservatives, by including a few Liberal Unionists, who don't like the new prohibition measures and who say so in a most beligerent manner.
This sudden interruption is being the whole session. It was had enough with the soldiers civil reestablishment recommendations and possible railway proposals coming at the last moment but this prohibition crisis puts everything out of joint. It is evident that the government does not expect heavy opposition from the house of commons or even from the senate. The introduction of the bills at a late date may have been to reduce the possibility of opposition to a minimum. What has happened, however, is this: a group of its own members, numbering between twenty-five and thirty, among those present are said to have been Messrs. Cockshutt, of Brantford, Best, of Dufferin and Wallace, of Centre York, who is said to have been the spokesman of the delegation. One of the chief complaints of the malcontents is that the proposals were not submitted to caucus. It does seem strange that the government should not have acquainted its members of its intention. The cabinet probably thought it had done so to a sufficient extent when it introduced the bills. It is a strange mixture of arguments and motives. Such as frequently come in abnormal days preceding an election.
It was hinted by the Government, by at least one member, that it was his opinion the new federal laws were designed with the object of defeating Hearst.
It seems to be a pretty general opinion around the house that the insurgents have not acted wisely, although the government is coming in for criticism because it did not make its follower more thoroughly acquainted with its plan.
The fact that it is a member of the Ontario Government had communicated with the revolvers, suggesting or approving of the action they took against the government. The members of the Ontario members there is a contention here that the proposed changes would give the provinces more power than the B.N.A. Act. The Government thinks there is nothing in this constitutional objection, but the state may arise on any straw. As a matter of fact although it is the provincial legislatures who would ask for a vote under the proposed Canadian Temperance Act, it is the Federal Government that takes the vote under its own auspices and on its own lists. They do not give up their control.

BRITISH MINERS ON STAGE TO ASK NATIONALISATION

TO MEET PREMIER LLOYD GEORGE, TO-DAY
LONDON, Oct. 9.—With the country not yet recovered from the effects of the railroad strike, British miners will take the stage to-day, when a deputation will call on Premier Lloyd George to press for the complete nationalisation of mines. The deputation, as announced, consists of members of the parliamentary committee of the Trades Union Congress, which met recently in Glasgow, and members of the executive committee of the Miners' Federation.
By a coincidence, J. H. Thomas, Secretary of National Union of Railwaymen, and leader of the recent strike, will head the deputation as the new chairman of the parliamentary committee.
This step will be taken in accordance with a resolution adopted at the recent Trades Union Congress at Glasgow, which pledged the congress to co-operated with the miners federation in compelling the government to accept a majority report submitted by the Coal Commission, headed by Sir John Sankey.
It will be recalled that Premier Lloyd George before Parliament adjourned, announced the government's decision not to accept the majority report, which recommended shorter hours, higher wages and a reform in the ownership system and suggested nationalisation, but said the government would merely nationalise the mines with a sort of joint control of the industry.
If Mr. Lloyd George reiterates this decision to-day and refuses to accept nationalisation, as it is assumed he will, a special Trades Union Congress will be convened to decide upon the form of action to be taken by the miners to compel acquiescence in their demands.

THREE PROPOSALS MADE TO U.S. INDUSTRIAL BOARD

TRUCE AND ARBITRATION BOARD WANTED
WASHINGTON, Oct. 9.—An immediate industrial truce, to continue three months; the creation of an Arbitration Board by President Wilson and congress; and the immediate arbitration of the nation-wide steel strike, were among the proposals made to-day to industrial conference here.
The first two were presented by representatives of the public and the last by the labor group. Bernard M. Baruch, chairman of the public group, made the proposal for the industrial truce, while Samuel Gompers, President of American Federation of Labor, and chairman of the Labor group, proposed the arbitration of the steel strike. Gompers' plan contemplated the immediate return of the steel strikers to work, pending the outcome of efforts to arbitrate the dispute.

COMMITTEE DOES NOT FAVOR NEW GRATUITIES

SAYS DISPATCH FROM OTTAWA (Special to The Record)
OTTAWA, Oct. 9.—A special committee on soldiers' civil reestablishment is expected to report in a few days. What its recommendations will be is not at present known but is fairly certain that neither of the bonus schemes proposed by the Gratuity Association, and the Great War Veterans will find favor in the report.
However many friends the two schemes may have in the committee, they are not many, it is fairly clear from the evidence given by Sir Thomas White, and Deputy Minister of Finance Boyle, that the financial condition of the country precludes the possibility of further gratuities, either of four or eight hundred millions. It is a matter of inability to meet the demands quite as much as it is a matter of advisability.
The committee generally speaking, does not favor any scheme which proposes to bonus members of the expeditionary force.

SELF-GOVERNMENT FOR IRELAND

Said That Proposals Have Been Explained to Government's Friends.
New York, Oct. 9.—The Tribune's London correspondent in a cable tonight says that the Government's plan for Ireland is being explained to friends of the Cabinet, who declare that Lloyd George plans the most liberal form of self-government possible short of actual separation.
